Dengue kills 83 in India

India's best monsoon in a decade has triggered a wave of dengue fever that has killed at least 83 people across the country and infected more than 5,100 in one of the worst outbreaks in years.

"We fear the number of people infected could be three times more," a health ministry official told Reuters yesterday.

The mosquito-borne disease, which causes high fever and haemorrhaging, usually peaks during the annual monsoon,

normally infecting about 1,000

Southern Kerala state has been the worst hit, with 63 deaths. Several people have also died in the Indian capital, New Delhi.

"We are distressed and worried for our children," said doctor Kiran Coelho, whose 23-year-old daughter and 17-year-old son were admitted to a hospital in Mumbai on Monday.

"There is no cure for the disease. Only supportive treatment

Hospital waste management launched in city BSS, Dhaka

Hospital waste management has been launched on a small scale in the city aiming to check recycling of used injection needles and saline Under a pilot project incorporat-

ing 11 clinics and hospitals, injection needles and saline syringes are being destroyed, UNDP sources said on Thursday The project is being implemented

by Initiative for people's Development (IPD), a nongovernment organisation.

The main objective of the project is to act as an eye opener for the policymakers. It is also aimed at creating awareness among concerned people and finding a suitable technology to manage the hospital waste, the sources said.

Hospital staff including doctors, nurses and cleaners have also been made aware of the consequences of the unplanned disposal of the medical waste.

Under the project, the medical waste is collected in a hygienic manner at all the 11 clinics and taken to city's Bhashantek area, where the syringes and needles are destroyed.

"This is not a modern solution, but it is better than doing nothing. said IPD Secretary General Dr Mahmudur Rahman. He said it is an attempt to check

the spread of diseases like HIV/AIDS and jaundice, which are mainly caused by the use of recycled syringes Every day the capital city produces 4,500 to 5,000 tonnes of solid waste, one per cent of which is

needles, plaster, separated human organs, foods, and remains of injection and distilled water.

Of the waste, the used syringes are currently being recycled by a vested group, who buy them from the poor collectors at a very cheap price and make those reusable under fake brands, sources said.

Used syringes have posed a serious threat to the civic life with high possibilities to spreading HIV/AIDS and other infectious diseases, said Tanzia Haque Hossain, national coordinator of LIFE, an UNDP-funded waste management project.

She said the medical waste is being sold and recycled in Dhaka and other major cities across the country. It is also polluting other wastes due to mixture with other solid wastes.

Management of medical waste is still at the planning level in the country. Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) and the Japan International Corporation Agency (JICA) have recently signed a minutes to prepare a solid waste management master plan within 14 months from

November this year. Almost all the 600 city clinics and hospitals have no exclusive system required to dispose of their waste.

Fighty per cent doctors, nurses and lab technicians are not aware of the fact that different kinds of biowaste should be kept in separate disposal bins to minimise the hazards from such waste, said a recent study of the voluntary organisation, Waste Concern.

China launches space trip this week

China will launch its first manned spaceship this week, aiming to become the third country after the Soviet Union and the United States to put a man in orbit.

The official Xinhua news agency said yesterday that the Shenzhou V would be launched between October 15 and 17 at an "appropriate time" from a launch pad in the Gobi desert in northwestern China and orbit the Earth 14 times.

It was the first official confirmation of the launch window on a mission China has kept under tight

"The Shenzhou V spacecraft will carry out the first manned space

mission and will lift off from the China Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre," Xinhua quoted an official in charge of the country's space program as saying.

"Now all preparatory work for the launch is progressing smoothly.

Sources at two major state-run television stations and a tour operator told Reuters early this week the launch had been provisionally set for the morning of October 15, barring bad weather.

And Hong Kong's Beijingbacked Wen Wei Po newspaper said the craft would fly for 21 hours, or 90 minutes per orbit, before floating back down to Earth the next
