Subsidy to double for 13 types of farm industries

Vegetables, agro-based product exporters to get perk

STAFE CORRESPONDENT

The government will increase subsidy to 13 types of agro-based industries by allowing 15 percent rebate on power tariff instead of the current 7.5 percent

Besides, the government will provide 25 percent cash incentives to vegetables and agro-based product exporters instead of the present 15 percent. Fruits exporters will get 25 percent incentive instead of the current 20 per cent.

The decisions were taken at a meeting chaired by Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman with

officials of the agriculture and energy ministries and other departments

Bangladesh Bank Governor Dr Fakhruddin Ahmed, Finance Secretary Zakir Ahmed Khan. Energy Secretary SM Shamsul Alam and the chairmen of Dhaka Electric Supply Authority (Desa), Rural Electrification Board (REB)

and Power Development Board (PDB) were present. Sources said REB sought Tk 16.50 crore in subsidy to which the finance minister agreed.

The subsidies are to be spent on agro-based industries such as

fisheries. fruit processing factories salt and pulse processing, seeds and silk, poultry and dairy.

cial power tariff of REB ranges between Tk 3 and Tk 4 per kilowatt hour. With the new rebate, the agrobased industries will get the same between Tk 2.55 and Tk 3.4.

An additional Tk 20 crore will be made available to the Department of Agriculture Extension and various agriculture research organisations under the Ministry of Agriculture for the development of

the farm sector.

Traffic jams at Paturia and Daulatdia ferry terminals somewhat improved yesterday but navigability of the main Paturia-Daulatdia channel in the Padma remains poor as authorities struggled to open up a new channel.

Two ferries ran aground on shoals near the Daulatdia ferry terminals yesterday morning and were stranded for hours before being rescued by a tugboat, BIWTC (Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation) sources said

Sources said the BIWTA (Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority) carried out frantic efforts to remove sands deposited at the channel and is hopeful about opening up the new channel by today.

Battle on at Ctg Port to keep sinking ship afloat

Chittagong Port authority is battling to keep a sinking foreign ship, brought for scrapping, afloat at outer anchorage due to a leak in its hatch since Sunday morning.

MV Ocean Breeze, a St Vincent flagged vessel with a capacity of 50,000 tonne and 25 Indian crew on board, is tilted to an angle and the port authority has sent two tugboats to pump water out of the vessel officials said vesterday.

"The vessel appears to be out of danger and rescue boats have restored power to the ship", said Captain Amirul Huq, a member (operation) of Chittagong Port. adding that if the ship sinks it may block movement of ship at outer



US draft now sets target for power transfer timeline

UN to hear fresh

An amended US draft resolution on Iraq is to be presented to the United Nations Security Council late last night, diplomats have said.

The US resolution has been redrafted to win international support for peacekeeping and reconstruction in Iraq after an earlier text failed to draw broad backing.

The new text -- which has not yet been released -- will be cosponsored by the UK and Spain, who both contributed to the resolution

UK Foreign Secretary Jack Straw told a meeting of EU foreign ministers in Luxembourg that he hoped there would be a vote on the resolution this week, a diplomat attending the meeting said

The revised draft would also call on Iraq's Governing Council to fix a timeline by December 15 for the transfer of power to Iraqis, council diplomats said yesterday.

Washington informally submitted the latest draft to the council's 14 other members over the weekend, but no date has been set for a vote on the new text or even for its formal introduction, the diplomats said.

A previous version of the resolution set no deadline and no timeline for a return to self-government for Iraq, which has been under US and British control since London and Washington invaded the Middle Eastern nation seven months ago, accusing Baghdad of concealing weapons of mass destruction. France, Russia and Germany

Energy ministry ponders frugal florescent option

REJAUL KARIM BYRON

The energy ministry has drafted a proposal to popularise compact florescent lamps (CFLs) by withdrawing import duty what it believes will cut power consumption by 345 megawatts.

"All government offices will have to switch to the low-powerconsuming CFLs instead of conventional bulbs and contribute to energy saving," a Power Development Board official said.

The reduction in power consumption will ease brownouts by saving electricity worth about Tk 417 crore. The 'saved' power can be supplied to half a million new consumers The proposal will be placed at the

cabinet committee for economic affairs in a few weeks for approval.

About 6.5 million users presently consume 3,500 megawatts of power. Of them, 5.97 million commercial and domestic users consume 1,217 megawatts and use an estimated 550 megawatts to light bulbs.

Another 1.7 lakh industrial consumers use 1,032 megawatts, 50 megawatts of them on electrical bulbs.

Others, including bulk users, consume the rest.

The CFLs can replace the use of conventional bulbs burning 600 megawatts and will produce the same level of light consuming only SEE PAGE 11 COL 6 A man Sunday night allegedly beat his wife to death at Shahjahanpur Railway Colony, Motijheel.
