Shoaib loses ban appeal

AFP. London

Pakistan fast bowler Shoaib Akhtar has lost his appeal against a Test match and two one-day internationals ban.

Shoaib will miss the second Test against South Africa at Faisalabad starting on Friday and the first two games of a five-match home one-day series against New Zealand next month.

Shoaib was banned by International Cricket Council match referee Clive Lloyd for using foul language against South African tail-ender Paul Adams during the first day of the first Test in Lahore last Friday.

Former Australia captain Richie Benaud, appointed to hear the appeal by the ICC's Code of Conduct Commission said Shoaib had admitted he was guilty.

"In my view, the reason for the implementing of the ICC Code, is so captains in particular and players in general, will embrace the Preamble to the Laws of Cricket, which makes guite clear what is required of them on the field," Benaud said.

"The appeal I am asked to determine relates to the sentence imposed by Lloyd, not to the actual offence.

"It seems to me that Lloyd correctly followed the Code of Conduct rules in every way after Shoaib Akhtar accepted, and said, he was guilty.

He had been included in the second Test squad despite the ban and fitness problems. Pakistan won the first Test.

Stephen Fleming's Black Caps scored a moral victory by drawing both Tests in what was billed as a grudge series for the Indians after their humiliating 2-0 defeat in New 7ealand last year. The Kiwis, who have never won
