

T was in 1971, during the Liberation War of Bangladesh, when I fled to India with my family', Deepa Khandokar reminisces. 'I was about twelve years old. My brother Biplob Das, a writer and singer, had come along too. In India, some of the artistes like Fakir Alamgir, Rafiqul Alam, Mitali Mukharjee and others had formed a cultural group. We would go from camp to camp and inspire the freedom fighters through our cultural activities. It was during those days, when my brother Biplob wrote a script for a dance drama, which I performed in. That was my beginning as a dancer.

Deepa's first formal guru was Ustad GA Mannan from whom she began taking dance lessons a year after independence. She also took lessons from Pijush Kiran Paul, Gowhar Jamil, Altamas Ahmed and Laila Hassan
