#### Ramadan begins tomorrow

The holy month of Ramadan begins tomorrow as the moon of the lunar

month was not sighted yesterday. The National Moon Sighting Committee at a meeting yesterday said it neither sighted the moon nor received news of any sighting from

anywhere in the country yesterday. Ramadan office hours for government, autonomous and semiautonomous organisations have already been announced.

From Saturday to Wednesday, office timings will be from 9:30am to 3:30pm while on Thursday from 9:30am to 2:30pm. There will be a 15-minute break for Zohr prayers from 1:15pm to 1:30pm every day.

However, institutions rendering essential public services such as commercial banks, post offices and hospitals will follow their own schedules.

In a statement yesterday, President lajuddin Ahmed greeted countrymen on the occasion of Ramadan and said its teachings will pave the way for peace and welfare

## 5,000 extra personnel to curb crime

Special drive during Ramadan to clear footpaths off iftar shops, traffic jams

Forty mobile courts and as many police checkpoints backed by around 5,000 additional personnel will be set up in the capital to keep close tabs on law and order during

Action will be taken against traders who throw up makeshift shops on footpaths to sell iftar, the home ministry yesterday decided. The courts and checkpoints will

run from the first day of Ramadan. A home ministry meeting chaired by State Minister SEE PAGE 11 COL 4 | Lutfozzaman Babar and attended by

Mayor Sadeque Hossain Khoka and the home secretary, among others, took the decisions.

The mobile courts to be led by magistrates will work from 10:00am to 4:00pm and also act against adulterated food sellers. The checkpoints will work from 10:00am to

Teams of police, BDR and ansars will assist the courts. They will also crack down on wrongly parked cars and illegal roadside establishments besides searching through vehicles.

## US col killed as rockets Another man dies hit Baghdad hotel

American deputy defence secy survives attack

In a daring strike, insurgents attacked the heart of the US occupation yesterday, unleashing a barrage of rockets against the Al Rasheed hotel where US officials live and where visiting Deputy Defence Secretary Paul Wolfowitz was stay-

ing. Wolfowitz escaped, but an American colonel was killed and 15 people were wounded.

Scores of American officials fled the hotel in pajamas and shorts after the 6:10am assault, which apparently used a makeshift rocket battery on a timer that had been wheeled into a nearby park. More

than a half-dozen holes pockmarked the hotel's concrete facade and windows were shattered in two dozen rooms.

Wolfowitz, who appeared shaken as he addressed reporters at a convention centre across the street where most officials fled, vowed the SEE PAGE 11 COL 7



# Locals lay siege to Khilgaon Police Station

Angry locals from Meradia hemmed in Khilgaon Police Station yesterday following the death of Shakil Ahmed Chowdhury Sumon in police custody.

Defying heavy showers, over 200 residents of Meradia led a procession to the police station. They laid siege to the police station for about 45 minutes and chanted slogans demanding punishment to the officer-in-charge (OC) and others responsible.

However, no untoward incident took place during the siege, and the Khilgaon police station OC remained in his office during the siege.

Earlier, a few hundred locals crowded the Meradia home of Sumon, 20, when his body was taken

there at about 2:00pm following the post mortem by a three-member board at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) yesterday. He was buried in Meradia graveyard after his namaj-e-janaja yesterday.

Medical board sources said that marks of torture were found on his legs and hands. No evidence was found that the young man died from wounds suffered in a jump from the roof of a six-storey building, as suggested by the inquest report.


