JU students submit memo to vice chancellor

General students of Jahangirnagar University (JU) yesterday submitted a memorandum to the vice-chancellor demanding immediate restoration of normal situation on the campus.

They also threatened to enforce a tougher programme if the authorities do not take measures to end the present stalemate in academic and administrative activities.

The memorandum was signed by 487 students of different departments of the university.

Earlier, the students decided to submit separate memorandum to Jahangirnagar University Teachers' Association (JUTA), and Teachers' Association of Jahangirnagar University (TAJU) urging them to keep the examinations out of the purview of the current movement and solve other problems.

But they changed the decision after observing the necessity of the movement to restore a stable situation on the campus.

The JUTA, at a press conference on October 28, explained the necessity of ongoing teachers' movement.

Leaders of Bangladesh Chhatra Front (BCF) and Bangladesh Chhatra Federation (BCF) in separate statements yesterday demanded of the authorities to take immediate measures to end the current deadlock

They also urged the students to be united to resist, what they said, the autocratic activities of the authorities.

Meanwhile, the VC, two Pro-VCs and the treasurer yesterday called on the JUTA to take classes and conduct examinations to reduce session jam, says a press release.

All classes and examinations remained unofficially withheld till yesterday the 16 consecutive day due to indefinite strike called by the JUTA to press for their two-point demand including the removal of VC.

The other demand is punishment to the Jatiyatabadi Chhara Dal (JCD) activists who had kept confined the authorities of Shaheed Salam Barkat (SSB) Hall on August 11.

About 70 percent of the students have already left the campus in the face of the teachers' movement

Hasina returns home

She also urged the German entrepreneurs and investors to invest in Bangladesh's small and medium industries.

\$ 1.20 lakh ADB grant to review arsenic situation

Asian Development Bank (ADB) will give Bangladesh 120,000 US dollars as technical assistance grant to review the situation of arsenic contamination in the country and evolve a strategy to address it.

The goal of the grant is to provide safe drinking water and improve the health and economic conditions of the people exposed to arsenic and other groundwater contamination, says an ADB release from its head-quarters in Manila.

The grant will go to Local Government Division to compile the progresses of ongoing mitigation activities and formulate a strategy suggesting priority interventions with specific timeframe.

Arsenic contamination was identified as a problem in the mid-90's when groundwater was believed to be the most dependable source of safe drinking water while

Norwegian help sought for integrated dev of CHT

Foreign Minister M Morshed Khan has sought cooperation of Norway for the integrated development of the Chittagong Hill Tracts and disaster management in the country

He made the request when the new Norwegian Ambassador Ms Aud Lise Norheim paid a courtesy call on him at his office yesterday.

Welcoming the new Norwegian envoy, the Foreign Minister assured her of all cooperation in discharging her responsibilities in Bangladesh.

Norway is a good friend and an important development partner of Bangladesh, said the Foreign Minister.

The Norwegian ambassador hoped that bilateral relation that exists between the two countries would be further strengthened in the days to come.

most people have developed the habit of drinking tube-well water.

Until then, Bangladesh earned appreciation from external agencies for its tremendous achievement of 97 per cent access to safe drinking water from some 4 million tubewells installed across the country in last three and a half decades. It was a great relief also for the country often exposed to diarrhoeal dis-

Some 50,000 tube-wells have so far been tested and 63 per cent of them have been found contaminated with unacceptable concentrations of arsenic. The permissible

e limit of arsenic concentration in water is 0.05 milligram per litre.

Long-term health effects of arsenic concentrations are extensive, resulting in arsenicosis, skin cancers and damages to kidney, stomach and lever.

So far, some 4000 cases of arsenicosis patients have been identified while the government is conducting surveys to identify patients of arsenic contamination with assistance from external sources.

The health effects of drinking arsenic-contaminated groundwater could be reduced by 70 per cent by

replacing 31 per cent of the tubewells in the country with deeper wells, some surveys suggest.

The government, with assistance from development partners, has initiated pilot projects in this

Although arsenic contamination in groundwater has been reported from various regions of the world, including Taiwan, Argentina, Alaska, Chile, Mexico, China, Mongolia, Ghana and Hungary, the single largest contamination has so far occurred in the lower Ganges delta region covering parts of Bangladesh and Indian state of West Bengal.
