Govt agrees to withdraw L/C margin by December

Savings instrument rates to be pegged to market to get IMF loan

The government vesterday committed to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) that it will completely withdraw margin on letters of credit (L/Cs) on imports and peg interest rates on savings instruments to market by December.

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) will also form a fully-fledged Large Taxpayers' Unit (LTU). In exchange, the IMF will dis-

burse the \$70 million second tranche of the Poverty Reduction Growth Facility (PRGF) loan.

The government yesterday finalised a memorandum of economic and financial policy (MEFP) with a visiting IMF mission, outlining the tasks for the government by

December. This five-member mission came to Dhaka on October 17 to assess the progress in commitments that the government made.

The IMF mission led by its Assistant Director Chanpen Puckahtikom held a meeting with Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman at his residence yesterday. Bangladesh Bank Governor Dr Fakhruddin Ahmed and Finance Secretary Zakir Ahmed were pres-

"We have agreed on the draft MEFP," Puckahtikom told journalists after the meeting. "Now it is up to

the government to finalise it." Back in June, the IMF board approved a \$490 million PRGF loan for Bangladesh to be disbursed in seven instalments. The first instal-

ment of \$70 million was disbursed in late June and the IMF board will decide the second installment at a meeting on December 17.

In the last 12 days, the visiting IMF mission met high officials of the finance ministry, Bangladesh Bank, NBR, energy ministry and other important offices. They discussed reforms of the nationalised commercial banks, state-owned enterprises and the power sector.

Following the IMF suggestions, the central bank cut L/C margin on imports down to 50 percent this month

PDB quick to restore power supply

The Power Development Board (PDB) yesterday remarkably restored power supply across the country in less than 24 hours after the Wednesday's massive blackout.

The PDB engineers made 22 out of 23 power plants of the country up and running -- meeting the full peak demand of 3483 mega watt (MW). The left out plant is one of the two units of 420 MW Raozan power plant. The unit needs three days to start up again.

Experts have fixed the technical glitch at Ashuganj substation that led to the shut down of 21 power plants one after another Wednesday at 9:40am, sources said.

"To restore regular power supply, we have replaced a system called bas-bar loop and a 132 KV bushing in the substation." said a PDE official

The two 64 MW power units in Ashuganj were installed in 1970. As units were poorly they have been refurbished recently and those are now generat SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

Locals besiege Khilgaon Police Station again

Locals at Meradia laid siege to Khilgaon Police Station yesterday demanding immediate arrest of the officials involved in the killing of Shakil Ahmed Chowdhury Sumon in police custody

Over 400 people marched the police station at about noon to besiege for two hours.

They chanted slogans demanding arrest of Entajer Rahman, former OC of the police station, and second officer Mahbub. They also demanded capital punishment to the alleged killers.

"We want to see that Entajer and Mahbub are arrested," Sumon's uncle Jasim Uddin told a rally during the siege. Pointing out that withdrawal of Rahman was insufficient he added, "we can not let the killers go scot-free".

UN withdraws staff from Iraq 'temporarily'

The United Nations has ordered the withdrawal of its remaining international staff from Baghdad as part of a review of the security situation

there. "We have asked Baghdad staff to come out temporarily for consultations with people from headquarters on the future of our operation," UN spokeswoman in Geneva Marie Heuze said yesterday.

UN officials insist they are not pulling out of Iraq -- the withdrawals

would be staggered, meaning there would always be a presence in the Iraqi capital.

The order comes amid ongoing attacks on aid workers -- the latest was on the Red Cross headquarters n Baghdad on Monday, which killed 12 people.

The bombing was one of a series of attacks that left a total of 36 dead making it the bloodiest day since the start of the US-led occupation.

Both the UN and the Red Cross have already said they will reduce their numbers in Iraq.

An estimated 50 foreign UN workers are said to remain in Iraq after most were pulled out following a devastating attack on UN headquarters in August that also killed top UN envoy Sergio Vieira de Mello.

The Red Cross has not yet determined how many staff to pull out - a move decided on in the wake of the first suicide attack ever on the humanitarian organisation.

Months ago, Anis also made a down payment of Tk 50,000 on a service charge of Tk 1.30 lakh and

submitted his passport to a middleman of a recruiting agency although it is still months away before Malaysia allows fresh workers following a ban in 1997.

People have lost money like that to dishonest middlemen and Anis is playing a dangerous gamble he hopes will pay off. But that will not happen until he gets a visa which he

does not know when, if at all Meanwhile, his agent told him to obtain a medical report, which costs Tk 1,000, but the report is valid for 45 days only and unless he flies to his cherished destination within this time period, he will need to get a fresh report.

Rain may tame raging fires in California

Rain and incoming fog may help Californian firefighters tame voracious fires that have killed 20 people and devoured thousands of homes in their raging path.

Fire officials said the only hope they had for preventing a repeat of Wednesday's disaster on Lake Arrowhead in the San Bernardino mountains was incoming fog that

was expected to creep in from the ocean and envelop the mountains by the week's end. Rain and some sleet had also

started falling on Thursday morning in some parts of the devastated state. "The good news is that a little too late the weather is changing on us. ... We will still have trouble (on Thursday) in the higher elevations, but by Friday we will get higher


