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Chopper downed in Iraq, 15 GIs killed

At least 15 American soldiers were killed and 21 wounded after a US helicopter was shot down in Fallujah in the bloodiest single strike on US-led forces since they invaded Iraq to oust Saddam Hussein.

The crippled Chinook helicopter came down in farmland at 9:00am (1:00am EST) near the village of Baisa, south of Falluja, a fiercely anti-U.S. town 30 miles west of the capital.

US helicopters circled above the smoking wreckage. Other helicopters and US Humvee vehicles were parked

US Army spokesman Colonel William Darley told reporters that the cause of the crash was under investi-

Witnesses said the helicopter, carrying troops on a rest and recreation break, had been shot down by

Some Iraqis were jubilant. "The Americans are pigs. We will hold a celebration because this helicopter went down -- a big celebration," said wheat farmer Saadoun Jaralla near the crash site. "The Americans are enemies

It was the third time a US helicopter was brought down since US President George WBush declared major combat over in Iraq on May 1. The Americans invaded in

"Clearly it is a tragic day for Americans," Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld told ABC television. "In a long hard war we are going to have tragic days."



Intelligence agencies asked to watch cops

The home ministry has instructed inter-departmental intelligence agencies to monitor police activities in Dhaka and other major cities in the wake of their increasing involvement in extortion and other crimes.

"We have asked the inspector general of police (IGP) to help the intelligence agencies monitor police activities and pinpoint their criminal involvement," a top official of the ministry told The Daily Star

The ministry also ordered a probe into all criminal incidents involving police and action against the guilty, the official said seeking anonymity

The officers-in-charge (OCs) and other high officials have been asked to keep a close watch on their forces following the deaths of three people in police custody in Khilgaon and Gulshan and mugging of Tk 2 lakh by four policemen of Khilgaon Police

Station recently.

In recent times, some law enforcers have been found involved in blackmailing. They frame innocent people and force them to pay money to avoid jail or police torture.

In Dhaka Metropolitan area, 20 written complaints were lodged against policemen in the last one year, but no action was taken against

Dhaka, Colombo to sign FTA next year

Bangladesh and Sri Lanka yesterday agreed to ink a free trade agreement (FTA) next year to be effective from the day of signing.

"I see no major difficulty in the negotiation. We are hopeful that the FTA will come into force next year," Manel de Silva, joint secretary and director general of the Department of Commerce of Sri Lanka, told newsmen at the conclusion of the two-day talks in Dhaka.

The joint secretary level talks began in Dhaka Saturday. Elias Ahmed, leader of a six-member Bangladesh team, and his Sri Lankan counterpart de Silva led Ministry of Commerce.

"I hope it will take a year to complete the negotiation and sign the deal," said Elias after the meeting. The FTA is now a global phenom-

A set of disgruntled army men gunned down Syed Nazrul Islam, Tajuddin Ahmed, AHM Quamruzzaman and Captain M Mansur Ali, four close associates of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur

Rahman, in Dhaka Central Jail on November 3, 1975.

The killing episode came two months and 18 days after Bangabandhu along with most of his family were assassinated in a military putsch.

A murder case was filed with Lalbagh Police Station following the day of killing, but the then government halted the trial issuing an indemnity ordinance.
