Styris loses all the money

Styris was fined 1,500 US dollars by referee Ranjan Madugalle of Sri Lanka for using abusive language after being declared leg-before to spinner Murali

'Suicide really'

The Bangladesh coach was gasping for words for the first few minutes when he appeared along with captain Khaled Mahmud to provide the postmortem of Bangladesh's 7-wicket decapitation at the MA Aziz Stadium vesterday.

The gloomy-faced 49-year-old was the first to admit that his boys had not put enough runs on the board.

"We didn't get runs that's why we lost the match. We lost the way and I have not witnessed anything like that before. We were going along quite nicely but suddenly we were five wickets down in the space of two eventful overs and that shattered everything. It was just suicide really,'

said Whatmore reflecting on his team's batting failure. Bangladesh made 143 runs before being all out in 44.4 overs.

"It might be a number of things but what we have seen is not at all acceptable. But I think the boys are not bad players and they don't deserve to be bowled out for 80 or 90 runs," he said. Despite suffering their 45th con-

secutive defeat, Whatmore still wanted to point to some positives from the one-sided affair. "Some positives did come out of it

like the team reached 143 runs after losing seven wickets for 66 only." Whatmore however was quick to dismiss that the Chittagong wicket had anything to do with Bangladesh's

batting failure. "In terms of wicket perhaps Bangladesh batsmen were deceived by the bounce but it was not a fast track. I think this was a good wicket and if we could have got 220-230 runs on the board it might have been a different ball game," explained the Sri Lankan-

Whatmore was however full of praise for England's talented allrounder Andrew Flintoff, who celebrated his return from injury claiming four wickets for 14 runs and then smashed an unbeaten 55 off 52 balls.

"Freddie came up in the second team and frustrated everybody. He is an exciting cricketer and has a couple of decent and favourable years ahead of him," said Whatmore about the Lancashire man-of-the-match.

While Whatmore dominated the post-match show captain Mahmud was down in the dumps especially after a section of the home crowd turned on

"Definitely this was not a nice reception. There is a need for some patience although the home crowd always carries high expectation. But l didn't mind because we didn't perform well," said the beleaguered Mahmud, who scored a duck in the SEE PAGE 14 COL 6

took four wickets for 26 runs to help his team book Kushtia for a paltry 92 in 45.3 overs after they elected to bat. Shanto was given good support by



Yesterday's terrible batting collapse against England at Chittagong was another example of carelessness and lack of pride that has become an unfortunate trait for Bangladesh in one-day internationals. Which is rather inexplicable, as they are not novices in this form of the game. It was Bangladesh's 80th one-day international and any excuses of inexperience just don't hold water.

The likes of Habibul Bashar and Alok Kapali haven't shown any signs of learning from their repeated mistakes.

More than anything, the team composition for the first ODI prompted more questions than answers. Three young cricketers were given their debuts, which was a mindboggling decision Nafees Iqbal, who had a frantic

flight home from Pakistan, only arrived in Chittagong on Thursday afternoon. So, the team think-tank's logic behind sending him to open the batting only hours later can only be termed overenthusiastic.

ACU looks into BNS power cut

The International Cricket Council's (ICC) flying squad, the Anti-Corruption Unit, has investigated the floodlight failure on the third day of the first Test between Bangladesh and England at the Bangabandhu National Stadium (BNS) in Dhaka last month.

The blackout occurred at the end of the third day's play at a time when Bangladesh had just begun their first innings and were facing a hostile opening spell from Stephen

The investigation was prompted by questions as to why the power failure only affected the floodlights and not any other electrical supply on the ground. It was that which made the official Bangladesh Cricket Board explanation that there had been "a grid failure somewhere down the line" fodder for the con
