### Germany welcomes Bangladeshi students for higher studies

Germany is encouraging Bangladeshi science graduates to pursue studies in different post-graduate and doctoral programmes by offering increasing number of scholarships.

The Deutscher Akademischer Austausche Dienst (DAAD) or the German Academic Exchange Service gave 68 scholarships last year out of 326 applicants while this year it is scrutinising 336 applications for the scholarship, said a visiting DAAD director at a press conference in the cityyesterday.

education programmes for Bangladeshi students.

He said Germany also encourages non-scholarship students to choose from over 300 international degree programmes covering business administration, information technology, engineering and natural sciences.

"The students need not to worry about the language barrier as English is the medium of instruction in most of the programmes," said Podewils.

Besides, students do not have to bear tuition fees as German taxpayers pay for them. Students only have to bear their living expenses, he said at the press conference that was also attended by Guido Genrich, second secretary, Consular and Cultural Affairs department of the German embassy.

"The DAAD believes that financial hurdles should not discourage promising students," he pointed out.

"DAAD provides financial assistance to post-graduate and doctoral students to cover their living expenses in Germany. But the selection procedure for these scholarships is very competitive," Podewils added.

One hundred ninety-six Bangladeshi students went to Germany in 2001-2002, and it rose to 273 in 2002-2003.

Second Secretary Guido Genrich pointed out that visa is granted to those students who provide all prerequisite documents properly.
