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# Govt plans to crush street agitation

# Reshuffle in police, cases against opposition leaders in pipeline

The government is planning crackdown on street demonstrations by the opposition, a home ministry

"We have specific information that the opposition parties will stage demonstrations from January and authorities are ready to crack down on anti-government agitation on the street," a home ministry official said, on condition that he not be

"A set of steps has been taken to ward off the opposition movement,'

another official of the ministry admitted. The government would have the streets occupied by procoalition activists when the opposition would stage agitation and other programmes, he elaborated.

Filing of cases against opposition leaders and activists will be another strategy. A list of activists and leaders organising anti-government agitation has been made to charge them,

Previous cases against opposition leaders may be revived as well, the home ministry official went on. A reshuffle in the police adminis

tration is also on the cards to take the opposition head on in the city. New police personnel loval to the ruling coalition will be drafted in Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) from outside, the sources added.

"We no longer can go soft on the opposition since they are involved in subversive activities," another home ministry official said, preferring to remain unnamed. There are scores of instances that the opposition is trying to create anarchy for political mileage, government sources alleged.

JAIL KILLING CASE Four special

prosecutors appointed

The government has appointed four special public prosecutors (SPPs) to conduct the trial in the historic Jail

Headed by Advocate Anisul Haq, the team comprises Advocate Shahara Khatun, Mosharaf Hossain Kajol and Kamrul Islam.

Driven by four SPPs, the 1975 case took effect in 1996 after the Awami League came to power but had none for nearly the last one year.

The BNP-Jamaat led government in December last year cancelled the four SPPs. Ever since, the AL has been demanding appointment of new SPPs, as the jail killing case is a special one.

The companies, dubbed as Z Group for failing to declare dividend or hold regular annual general meetings, are Bengal Steel Ltd., Karim Pipe Ltd., AB Biscuit Ltd., Dhaka Vegetable Ltd., Paragon Leather, Rupan Oil Ltd., National Oxygen Ltd., STM, Gem Knitwear, Bangla Process, TBL, JH Chemical, Mark Bd Shilpa, Texpic Industries Ltd., Highspeed Ship and Meghna

Following the move, the Dhaka Stock Exchange (DSE) General Index that had been on a sudden and 'abnormal' bull-run since Saturday lost 9.23 points to close at 973.88. However, the DSE-20, an index of blue chip companies, gained 42.06 points yesterday to close at 1300.52

The SEC found no logic in the price wildfire, as the financial health of many weak companies does not support the swing.

Analysts Tuesday cautioned

investors as they found no rationale behind the price run.

"Investors are requested to make investment decisions after considering both fundamental and technical analysis of securities. They are also requested not to invest in securities whimsically," the SEC advised.

### Cops to change colour for credibility

Police will soon shrug off the all too familiar blue shirt and khaki trousers -- one of the last vestiges of the old colonial era -- and switch to a light grey shirt and navy blue trousers from next month.

They said the move is aimed at giving police 'more credibility'. But the stain of perennial corruption that has come to be long associated with the old uniform, a stain that has earned police the dubious distinction of being the world's most corrupt organisation, will linger on in all likelihood, giving corruption an all new colour, sources observed.

The home ministry recently gave directives for the change considering the fact that the colour combination of the police uniform is being widely used by private citizens as well as security firms, making it difficult for police to stand out from

As for all metropolitan police short-sleeved olive shirts and navy blue trousers.

A paramilitary combat dress easily distinguishable from Army and Bangladesh Rifles uniforms will also replace the khaki of the Armed Police Battalion (APBn), a home ministry official said.

The new dresses have already been ordered and should be available SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

# Disparate agendas hold back plan for opposition unity

Opposition political parties are discussing a raft of points to fashion a unity, but key ideological and policy issues are holding back their plans for the launch of a unified anti-government movement.

For over six months now, the main opposition Awami League (AL) held a string of formal and informal talks with other opposition parties, particularly with the leftists, for what it says freeing the nation from the four-party coalition misrule.

Parties both within and outside the left 11-party grouping, have come up with different agendas for AL's consideration before they join hands with the former ruling party.

In recent months, the (CPB) and the Jativa Samajtantrik Dal (JSD-Inu) have illustrated different 'talking points' which they think would pave the way for a greater unity among themselves.

The 11 points of the JSD and six points of the CPB have one demand in common -- banning the Jamaate-Islami and religion-based politics. But the AL, which joined forces with the Jamaat against Khaleda Zia's

previous government, is yet to respond to the talking points.

The CPB put forward its six points to the AL on August 10, asking the main opposition to agree on issues like reviving the four original state principles, trying war criminals, banning Jamaat, waging a movement against the US-led war and gas export and protesting divestment of state-owned enterprises and layoffs.

Similarly, the JSD submitted its 11 points to the AL, also in August, laving out a formula for the formation of a national government after unseating the BNP-led alliance

To share its views with other parties, the JSD circulated the points to the CPB, Workers Party, Samyabadi Dal and Gono Forum

Other salient features of the points are formation of a bicameral parliament, strong local government bodies, abolition of Article 70 of the constitution (that bars one from speaking against party-line in parliament) and amendment to Article 118 to give greater powers to

# Firms catch clients on DoE premises

Representatives of some environment-related consulting firms have set up shop in a first-floor reception room at the Department of Environment (DoE) Dhaka office from where they solicit business.

The consulting firms try to catch those clients who come to the DoE for the environmental clearance that is required to set up any industry or other important establish-

Soliciting business from those seeking DoE clearance for their projects has become a common practice under the present government, department sources said. The consulting firms are well connected to the ruling BNP high command and other sectors of the government, the sources added.

DoE officials are often disturbed by the representatives of the consulting firms but do not have the

power to act against them due to their political connections, according to sources.

"One official tried to have them removed a few days ago but he did not succeed. Rather he was threatened with transfer from the Dhaka office," said a DoE official, "So nobody tells them anything now."
