Bolivia detains 16 including Bangladeshis on terror tip-off

Bolivia's state news agency said authorities in La Paz detained 16 Muslims on Thursday after a tip-off from French police that some of them were planning to hijack a plane and attack targets in the United States.

No independent confirmation was immediately available of the report from the ABI agency, which is regarded as a mouthpiece of the Bolivian government.

It quoted Interior Minister Alfonso Ferrufino as saying most of those arrested were Bangladeshis and that they were detained at Viru Viru airport near the southern Bolivian city of Santa Cruz on Thursday morning.

"(Ferrufino) said that the tip-off from French police said that the 16 Muslims were planning to hijack a plane en route from La Paz via Santa Cruz to Buenos Aires to attack targets in the United States,' the news agency report said

Govt takes hard line on contractual service

In a break with a two-year trend, the government has this time determined not to cave in to the high-pitched lobbying of contractual appointees for service extension in the civil administration.

A rash of contractual appointments in the last two years fuelled resentment in the administration and the government decided to extend the service of only a handful of officials on merit and unwavering allegiance to the ruling BNP, said sources at the Prime Minister's

Around 200 officials are in service on contract both at home and abroad. Three dozen of them are secretaries and over a dozen of them are set to retire by January.

But most contracts are not up for renewals after expiry, as the majority of officials were given extension more than once, the sources added.

The BNP-led four-party coalition government gave a wave of

repeat extensions, blocking the promotion of mid- and entry-level officials and making the officials on contract far outnumber regulars. Two of them are CSP (Civil Service of Pakistan) officials in secretarial positions.

In line with the new decision, the government did not extend the appointments of some top bureaucrats, including Planning Commission Member Shah Mohammad Farid, Privatisation Commission Member Karar Mahmudul Hasan and Parliament Secretary Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmed, whose contracts expired last

Only Cabinet Secretary Dr Saadat Hussain was given a oneyear contract last month

Contracts of President's ecretary Anisul Haq Chowdhury, Education Secretary Shahidul Alam, Local Government Secretary AYBI Siddigi, Power Secretary SM Shamsul Alam, incumbent Parliament Secretary Khandaker Fazlur Rahman, Primary and Mass Education Secretary Tehmina Hussain, Chairman of Rural Electrification Board Ziaul Islam Chowdhury, Director General at the PMO Abdul Majid, Director General of NGO Affairs Bureau Shahjahan Majumder, Chairman of Bangladesh Parjatan Corporation Harunur Rashid and Nasirul Haq of the Public Administration Training Centre expire this month.

BNP taking steps to put house in order

Ruling coalition leader Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) is embark-ing on a set of organisational programmes soon to put its house n order and face probable antigovernment agitation by the oppo-

Sources said the party, dogged by intra-party squabbles and growing frustration over top echeon's indifference to party affairs, will kick off conferences in some districts ahead of party national conference sometime next year.

"The conferences will inject dynamism and greater cohesion into the party erasing inertia and long-running feuds in its ranks," said a top BNP leader.

BNP sources said the party adership fixed the August deadline to complete formation of 75 organisational district committees, but only 30 were completed

The committee formation ran

into a roadblock in Ramadan and the party leadership is in favour of holding conferences in remaining units in next couple of months.

Sources said the BNP leadership is highly annoyed that leaders assigned to complete formation of fresh committees of thana and district units by August failed to finish their tasks despite repeated

Constitution of thana committees is largely complete by now and the remaining will be formed by December, BNP sources said.

They said the BNP high command has asked leaders to start committee formation in remaining thanas and districts after Victory Day on December 16 and complete the task in a month.

The Awami League's efforts to enhance its image ahead of launching an anti-government movement by erasing the dark shadow of godfather-famed former party leaders have been facing resistance in the pockets where their tentacles still extend.

The leaders of the key opposition party say the godfathers who earned the last AL government 'bad name' are trying to re-emerge in party ranks after its activities to put its own house in order by holding long-overdue party unit councils gathered pace

The general secretary of the party's Fatulla thana unit in Narayanganj, Md Shahid Ullah, resigned from the post yesterday in what political analysts in Dhaka say was a fallout of the godfather syndrome.

On Wednesday, central AL leaders including General Secretary Abdul Jalil suffered humiliation in Laxmipur when the

alleged sidekicks of Abu Taher vandalised the local circuit house where the council was taking place.

The attackers blamed the central leadership for announcing a committee without election, an accusation shrugged off by frontline central leaders who said the votes of 192 councillors could put 'the godfathers' men' on the

"After a glaring media coverage of the godfathers' activities during the Awami League rule (1996-2001), we can't allow known troublemakers to get berth in any party unit," an AL policymaker said.

Wednesday's trouble was a reminder of the May 31 attack on an extended Feni district unit meeting allegedly by the supporters of former lawmaker Joinal Hazari who was apparently earned

Commonwealth leaders open a summit here seeking to avert a damaging rift between African nations and their wealthy cousins over how to deal with Zimbabwe and its isolated President Robert Britain's Queen Elizabeth II,

making her first visit to Nigeria since independence in 1960, will formally open the four-day gathering and host President Ólusegun Obasanjo is hoping leaders will move beyond Zimbabwe's suspension from the Commonwealth and forge through a wide-ranging

"President Obasanjo does not want the issue of Zimbabwe to dominate the summit, there are so many other issues that matter,' Obasanjo's spokeswoman Remi Oyo told AFP.

But President Joachim Chissano of Mozambique, current president of the African Union, re-

opened the debate by regretting Mugabe's absence and calling for him to be readmitted to the global body of mostly former British

"We are disappointed that Zimbabwe is not here. We think that things will go for the better. Next time, hopefully he will be with us. We don't think that isolation is the best way if we want change in any country," he said.

Commonwealth Secretary General Don McKinnon admitted that member states had not changed their positions significantly in recent months but said he felt they would agree to insist on further progress in Zimbabwe before ending its isolation.

Zimbabwe was expelled from the Commonwealth in March last year after Mugabe was re-elected in a poll marred by violence and fraud, and the veteran leader has pointedly not been invited to this weekend's meeting.

Commonwealth leaders want to see real progress in talks between Mugabe's ZANU-PF party and the opposition Movement for Democratic Change (MDC) on finding a plan to rebuild democracy in a country riven by political and economic turmoil and menaced by famine.

Kokrajhar district, 235km west of Assam's capital Guwahati. "It could be the beginning of a

new era of peace and hope in Assam," the state's leader, Chief Minister Tarun Gogoi, told AFP.

At least six other ethnic separatist groups continue to fight in Assam, where more than 10,000 people have been killed in insurgency in the past two decades.


