

Brits in same boat



England must over-come the home-grown challenge of neighbours Wales and Northern Ireland as they bid to qualify for the 2006

World Cup finals in Germany after the qualifying draw here on Friday.

England manager Sven-Goran Eriksson was however relieved to have avoided the toughest European match-up with Holland pitted against the Czech Republic in Group 1 just days after being drawn to face each other in the Euro 2004

"The draw is okay," said

"Wales are obviously a very strong team. They had a good qualifying competition for Euro 2004. I am just happy to have

Wales manager Mark Hughes had personal reasons to be relishng the challenge of facing

"It's a great draw for us," said the former Manchester United

"When the ball came out and we were paired with England I honestly thought 'this is fantastic'.

"It's been 20 years since England and Wales played. I remember it well because I scored the winning goal that night and it was on my debut, in my home town of Wrexham."

England and Wales's group 6 also includes Northern Ireland, who failed miserably to qualify for Euro 2004, and Poland, Austria and

Hughes said he was optimistic of leading Wales to their first international finals since 1958 after digesting the disappointment of failing in the play-offs for Euro 2004 against Russia.

"It's going to be tough of course," Hughes said. "England are one of the top teams in the world at the moment,

but the disappointment of the European campaign also proved to us that we can compete at the highest level."

Only the eight group winners and the two best runners-up qualify for the finals from the European zone - the remaining six runners

Italy, who won the last of their three World Cups in 1982, have an easier-looking draw against Slovenia, Scotland, Norway, Belarus and Moldova

But Italy coach Giovanni Trappatoni believes a tough task lies ahead.

"Our group is the hardest with-out doubt. Before we play at Hampden against Scotland, we must remember that we lost in Cardiff against Wales in the qualifiers for Euro 2004, which put us in a lot of difficulty.'

Scotland coach Berti Vogts said his side could claim the runners-up

"I think it is possible. We beat Holland at home in the Euro 2004 playoffs and perhaps we could do the same against Italy. It's not a bad draw for us," said the German manager.

France, the 1998 World Cup winners, were paired with the Republic of Ireland who have ualified for two of the last three World Cups, but coach Jacques Santini was happy with the draw for Group 4.

Tail-ender Ashley Giles batted doggedly for more than a session as England survived a Muttiah Muralitharan scare in poor light to salvage a draw in the first Test against Sri Lanka here on Saturday.

Giles kept his cool in the tense last ession to score an unbeaten 17 off 111 balls as England, chasing a 323run target, finished at 210-9 in their second innings when bad light stopped play on the fifth and final

Ace off-spinner Muralitharan had boosted Sri Lanka's victory hopes on a turning track with a four-wicket haul before being thwarted by Giles, who continued to bat steadily despite as many as

five fielders close to the bat. England never made an earnest

attempt to achieve the victory target as they batted only for survival. They faced defeat at 171-7 at tea before finding a saviour in

Giles received valuable support from fellow-tailender Gareth Batty, who compiled a defiant 26 under pressure in only his second Test before being bowled by Muralitharan attempting a wild heave.

Tension kept mounting and light meters were constantly out as there were still more than 15 overs remaining in the match after Rettyl dismissed. Batty's dismissal.

England were pushed closer to defeat when Richard Johnson inner-edged a Muralitharan deliv-ery on to his stumps to become the spinner's 11th victim in the match,
