US air strike kills 9 Afghan children

US-led forces in Afghanistan have mistakenly killed nine children during an air strike on a leader of the banned Taliban regime, the US

Saturday's strike near the town of Ghazni also killed the Taliban leader, who has been blamed for the killing of two workers on a key highway project in the troubled south of the country.

Hours after the strike, suspected Taliban guerrillas kidnapped two Indians working on the same road.

A statement from spokesman Colonel Bryan Hilferty at the US headquarters in Afghanistan said vesterday the children's bodies had been found by ground troops of the US-led force near the body of the intended target.

It said it regretted the loss of innocent life and the "tragic incident" was being investigated. It said the US-led force had acted "after developing extensive intelligence over an extended period of

The statement did not identify

governor, Kheyal Mohammad Hussaini, said he was Mullah Wazir, a local Taliban leader. He said US planes had conducted the attack and local authorities had not been informed beforehand.

The United Nations said it was "profoundly distressed" by deaths of the children and called for a swift investigation.

"This incident, which follows similar incidents, adds to a sense of insecurity and fear in the country," SEE PAGE 11 COL 7



DCC kicks off weekly mosquito control drive

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) yesterday launched a two-day special mosquito control programme under the supervision of the DCC zonal executives instead of ward commissioners to ensure effectiveness of the drive.

Col Md Azizul Hoque, chief health officer of the DCC, yesterday said the city corporation is spraying larvicide routinely six days a week under the supervision of ward commissioners to eradicate mosquitoes in all the 10 zones identified as mosquito breeding points of the city including its 90

"But we have fixed Sundays and Wednesdays for spraying larvicide and adulticide under the zonal executive officers' supervision to make the programme much more fruitful," Hoque said.

As it is reported that the ward commissioners do not conduct the spraying one hour before sunset, the DCC has issued the order to run the spray at the recommended

The special drive on the two particular days in a week will continue in all the 10 zones. State

Minister for Expatriates Welfare and Overseas Employment Mohammed Quamrul Islam inaugurated the programme at 3:00pm yesterday at Gulshan-2 Ward No. 19 under zone 9.

Acting Mayor MA Quaiyum, Hoque and Assistant Director of Dhaka Mosquito Control Department (under Rural Government Division) Farid Uddin Ahmed, among others, attended the programme.

Hoque said his department has sought approval to purchase about 200 new foggers to offset the shortfall in the number of such machines.

Ahmed hoped the special drive will make mosquito control programme effective as most points of the city will be sprayed during the two-day period.

Currently, there are 565 hand sprayers and about 350 foggers, five ultra low volume (ULV) spray machines and 45 wheel-mounted spray machines in working condition, while 500 hand sprayers, 290 foggers and 47 ULV machines are out of order, said a official.
