Old grains in silos at risk of rotting

Rice, wheat pile up as govt replaces food with cash in FFW, FFE programmes

A large amount of grains runs the risk of rotting in warehouses, as the government did not take old stocks off the granaries this fiscal year,

The granaries filled with old stocks as the government replaced cereals with cash in food-for-work (FFW) and food-for-education (FFE) programmes, two major components of the public food distribution system, on July 1.

The donor-driven government decision came full circle after its partial implementation in fiscal 2002-03 following reports of corruption eating into 20 percent of the grains meant for FFW and FFE.

As a result, at least four lakh tonnes of rice and wheat have piled up in the 500 warehouses over the last six months, and the officials

alerted the government to the risk of rot because of lack of ventilation and pest control measures -- reminiscent of similar decay in 1991.

"The old stockpiles of grains have become a drag on us. A large volume of the stock has already expired its six-month shelf-life in a depot," a high official told The Daily Star, asking not to be named.

The officials said the food ministry received an early warning from the food directorate that the grains would decay if the government did not go for a quick release of old stocks clearing space for fresh intakes during the aman harvest.

They suggested that the government re-stack the sacks of grains in the depots to let fresh air in as a stopgap measure to save wheat and rice from quick rot.

BNP leader shot dead in Bagerhat

A leader of the ruling Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) was gunned down in Rampal upazila of Bagerhat district yesterday.

According to the officer-in charge of Rampal Police Station, assailants shot Shahidul Islam Talukder, 40, general secretary of Malli Kerberh Union unit of BNP, at about 11:00am when he came out of Malli Kerberh Madrassah after holding a meeting with the princi-

But witnesses, on the other hand, said gunmen sprayed bullets on the BNP leader when he was on the way to the madrassah at the call of Principal Moulana Abdul Kader to sit with him to resolve a longstanding dispute.

Police arrested Moulana Abdul Kader, also a leader of Rampal upazilla unit of Jamaat-e-Islami, former Jubo Dal president Nasiruddin and local BNP leader Enamul Huq in connection with the

The body of slain BNP leader was handed over to his family after autopsy at Bagerhat Sadar Hospital.

Beirut fire victims hail from Barisal, **Ihalakathi**

The seven Bangladeshis including three females died in a fire at Kismat Plastic Factory at Beirut, Lebanon on December 14, 2003, were from of Barisal and Jhalakathi.

Relatives of the victims alleged that the government failed to provide them with the names of the victims. They learnt those from local reporters of Beirut yesterday.

The victims are Israt Jahan Rabeya, her husband Kabir Howlader, Azizur Rahman and his wife Salma Begum, Liza, Ruma and Kalam Mallick -- all aged between 20 and 30 and employees of the same

Kabir hailed from Rupatali, Rabeya and Ruma from Nandapara and Liza from Boalia of Barisal, while Aziz and Salma hailed from Gouripasha and Kalam from Kasarmahol of Jhalakathi.

77 with 6 trawlers missing in Bay

Seventy-seven fishermen and six fishing trawlers are missing in the Bay of Bengal for the last three days.

Rescue operations that commenced yesterday morning could trace none of the missing persons or vessels until the time of writing this

There was a depression in the Bay Wednesday which forced many trawling vessels to pack up and head for safety of land. The trawlers that remain lost were also been returning in fleet from the high sea and all but six could make it to safer waters.

Among the missing trawlers, Tushkhali, with 12 crews, sank on its way back at Anadhaboa, some 80 kilometres from the shore. The men came from Pirojpur and Bagerhat

Sources said, due to a very rough sea, other boats of the fleet could not save or rescue any of the Tushkhali's crew. But the rest of that fleet could reach shelter at different points of the shore: in Meher Ali, Beyddar Khal, Mandarbaria, Narikelbaria, Mohipur and Haela Patharghata

About the other five trawlers that are still missing with 65 crews on board, Trawler Owners' Association of Patharghata said the (five) missing boats were scheduled to return from fishing that day. So, the association

anticipates that there is a chance those boats might have taken shelter elsewhere facing the rough weather. But they could also be drowned, of

"We are not sure whether the trawlers are really missing or not. But, so far, we have not received any information regarding their where-abouts," said Khalilur Rahman, general secretary of the association.

The association sent three trawlers vesterday morning to conduct a search operation for its missing trawlers and crew. But all three of the boats returned without any clue on

Donors won't join health programme

Failure to reach accord on project implementation paper

A three-year Health, Nutrition and Population Sector Programme (HNPSP) will be launched in January without the participation of donors, official sources said vesterday.

This is for the first time donors are not participating in a health programme in Bangladesh

We are launching HNPSP in January and we have already asked for Tk 2600 crore from the government exchequer for the three-year programme," said Health Secretary

The Health, Nutrition and Population (HNP) Donor. Consortium informed the External Resources Division (ERD) on mother and child healthcare, repro-November 27 that they would 'not be participating in HNPSP at least before January 2005 as the project implementation paper (PIP) has not been appraised, consulted or agreed upon by the development partners'.

The decision might create fund problems for the government, ources pointed out.

The HNPSP aims to increase

availability and utilisation of usercentred, efficient and affordable services under an Essential Services ductive healthcare and nutrition packages for clients.



The Beagle 2 Mars lander successfully separated from its mothership at 0831 GMT yesterday to begin its solo voyage towards a touchdown on Christmas Day.

The European Space Agency's Space Operations Centre (ESOC) in Germany received a signal that confirmed the release at 1112 GMT. The success marks a key moment in the ambitious mission.

30,000 Tentulia quarry workers lose job, hope amid BRD-BSF tension

About 30,000 people on the northernmost tip of Bangladesh are facing hardship as over 150 businesses that quarry in the Mahananda river have hit the rocks amid BDR-BSF tension.

Paramilitary Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) prohibited stone extraction from the Mahananda in the wake of a clash with Indian border guards, the Border Security Force (BSF), in April 2001.
