Saber however questioned the involvement of the Board in the affairs of each district.

Professionalism, decentralization,

"The focus of the Board should be towards providing a solid foundation for six divisions so that they can ultimately take care of the respective regions," said Saber adding it was already initiated during his time.

Emphasizing on a strong domestic set-up the Zimbabwean CEO Dudhia cited Australia as a prime example.

"Why is Australia so strong

today? Because the difference between their Test team and those playing in the first-class competition is minimal. That's why any first-class player can walk into the Test team," he said.

It was accepted that decentralization and a strong domestic cricket structure were inter-linked and to achieve both, the majority of the speakers advocated for a simultaneous progression of the two vital components.

Take cricket out of Dhaka was on everybody's lips.

"Our cricketers can only play a handful of matches per season. But when I visited Maharashtra in India I learned that players had taken part in 26 matches in that region alone", said former national-player-turned-umpire Ziaul Islam Masud.

"Now we identify a national player by the club he belongs to. But in future a player should be known by the region he represents. Only then can we generate a strong sense of belonging in any particular region," said a speaker.

But no wheels will move until the Board presents an efficient management team was the unanimous sentiment.

"I'm afraid all the people involved in the Board are not qualified to deliver high performance a unified approach at present", said former Bangladesh captain Gazi Ashraf Hossain.

Mahbub however disagreed that the appointment of the CEO was the first step to give a professional look to the Board.

The cricket committee chairman admitted that most of the Board officials were offering voluntary service at the moment but things hopefully will change for the better in six months time.

"We are aiming at having a team of managers who will be totally professional to execute the policies of the Board," said Mahbub.

He said that the Board was actively trying to give a legal authority to the post of CEO that contradicts the the NSC Act of 1974, where a general secretary is recognised as the top executive.

While everybody appreciated the appointment of the CEO, most speakers however feared that it would not be successful unless he is only accountable to the president of the Board. "Now heads of different commit-

ised by The

Daily Star with the slogan Building A More Competitive

The winter morning warmed up o the occasion at the Conference Room of the Daily Star when Editor and publisher of the newspaper Mahfuz Anam opened the unique discussion, which was attended by sixteen cricket personalities including former Bangladesh Cricket Board President (BCB)

Saber Hossain Chowdhury. The Daily Star Editor explained that the continuous poor performance at international level of the national cricket team has prompted this discussion which would try to come up with an ideal formula so that the future will be one of triumphs.

He started the proceedings calling upon the participants to identify the number one problem facing cricket in this country at the

Making his first public appearance at an event very close to his heart since bowing out of cricket's hot seat, Saber hammered on the necessity of having an independent and sound management structure to make cricket the country's number one sport in every respect.

"Our goal should be to take cricket to a certain level and make it the number one sport in the coun-There should also be a concrete guideline to help Bangladesh become the best cricketing nation in next 10 or 15 years," said Saber during the four-hour animated

He said that a consensus must be reached before formulating the policy and once it was in place then there should be no interference

from the politicians. "It should only be execution and implementation,'

While Saber was speaking from the sidelines, his successor Ali Asghar was conspicuously absent from what should have been an ideal platform for the BNP lawmaker from Khulna to address his

The presence of BCB's cricket committee chairman Mahbubul Anam along with the newly appointed CEO Mackey Dudhia however partially made up for his

The youthful exuberance of KZ Islam, who is widely acknowledged for launching the Nirman School Cricket tournament in the 80s, was the other highlight of the roundtable.

Speaking highly of cricket the former BCB president said that the game has done more to raise the image of the nation around the world than the Foreign Office had achieved in the past 32 years. BCB's tournament committee

chairman Shah Nurul Kabir Shaheen made a brief appearance. But the main talking point in the roundtable was his domain.

The need for a competitive domestic cricket structure was felt by all the participants. Everyone expressed dissatisfaction with the quality of the competitions, substandard pitches and too much

Dhaka-based cricket. "We should take cricket to all 64 districts of the country and we must ensure that domestic calendar should in no way be inter-rupted because of any international event," said KZ Islam.

Country's most successful international bowler Mohammad Rafique grabbed six wickets as Dhaka ounced back against aspirants Chittagong on the third day of their four-day Mirzapore Tea National Cricket League fixture at the Bangabandhu National Stadium

The star-studded Dhaka was in the driving seat at the end of third day's play as they took a 209-run overall lead after gaining an important first innings lead.

Away at Rangpur, a 91-run diligent innings by Parvez Ahmed enabled Sylhet fight back against Rajshahi in their second innings and set their opponents a 136-run victory target on the last day today.

There was good news at Jessore as the match between holders Khulna and Barisal finally started after two and half day's play being rained off.

One-day specialist Tushar Imran hit an unbeaten 73 to guide hosts Khulna score 143 for four wickets at stumps

DHAKA VS CHITTAGONG

A devastating bowling display by left-arm spinner Rafique gave hosts Dhaka a slim nine-run first innings lead and later national discards Al Shahriar and Sanwar Hossain did the job with the bat to turn the match in the home team's

After wrapping up the Chittagong first innings for 134 runs, Dhaka reached 220 for 6 in their second knock at stumps.

Earlier, the port city side resumed the day on 61 for two.

Stylish right-handed opening batsman Al Shahriar and Sanwar put up 116 runs for the second wicket to improve the hosts' batting in the second innings. Shahriar smashed 87 off 172 balls that produced eight boundaries while Sanwar added 52 off 92 balls, clouting five boundaries.

Tall off-spinner Sabbir Khan captured four wickets conceding 77 runs in 28 overs.

Earlier, although two overnight batsmen Faisal Hossain and Azam Iqbal made a good start for the visitors, but the innings just fell apart once Azam returned to the dressing room after making 27 off

First round hero Faisal was the top scorer with 52 runs off 124 balls that saw eight boundaries.

Rafique finished with figures of 26-11-45-6 and he was ably supported by right-arm pacer Khaled Mahmud who took three wickets conceding 31 runs in 16.3 overs.

RAJSHAHI VS SYLHET

Meanwhile, Sylhet recovered from an early setback to score 233 before being all out to take a 135-run lead against Rajshahi at Rangpur Cricket Garden.

Sylhet had started their second innings with a 98-run deficit and were all out for a respectable 233 runs in 97 overs after resuming the day on 15 for two.

Number five batsman Parvez Ahmed made the team highest 91 runs off 190 balls with seven hits to the fence while Hemel added 36 off 87 balls and Tushar 34 off 124.
