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# Bush wants to get rid of Arafat

Senior Hamas leader detained, Palestinian houses demolished

US President George W Bush told an Israeli journalist that "we must get rid of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, the mass-circulation Yediot Aharonot daily said yesterday.

Bush's comments came in a brief exchange with the paper's correspondent during a Christmas drinks party in Washington, several hours after a keynote speech by Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon Thursday in which he outlined plans

for unilateral disengagement from peace negotiations with the Palestinians.

The US government has boycotted Arafat with Bush accusing the veteran leader of failing the Palestinian people. Israel has also shunned the 74-year-old, branding him an absolute obstacle to peace and confining him to his West Bank headquarters for more than two

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# BNP men's attack foils AL's Munshiganj council

50 hurt, opposition workers try to break Section 144, BDR help sought

The triennial council of Munshiganj district Awami League could not be held yesterday as ruling BNP men put up barricades and attacked opposition workers, leaving at least 50 of them injured despite Section 144 clamped to forestall violence.

The attacks were carried out as the AL men tried to break roadblocks to force their way to the council venue, Balur Math, in town where BNP's student chapter Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) timed a protest rally to coincide with

The district administration sought two platoons of Bangladesh Rifles personnel late last night as the wave of violence sparked tempers in

Central leaders of the AL failed to reach the town as BNP men halted their cars by placing logs and parking trucks on the road to the council venue close to Bahu Mukhi High

Several hours into the roadblock, the frontline AL leaders including Amir Hossain Amu, Tofail Ahmed, Saber Hossain Chowdhury and Abdul Mannan drove back to Dhaka after they addressed an instant rally

at Sipahipara crossing.
Of the injured, Yunus Ahmed
Khan, 48, an AL leader, was stabbed and sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital with severe wounds.

His family said a gang of 12 beat and stabbed him as he reached the local BNP office shortly before

Section 144 was slapped two days ago when JCD's local unit scheduled its rally at the same venue to protest the stabbing of one of its leader allegedly by activists of AL's student wing Bangladesh Chhatra League

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#### Traqi pipelines, storage tanks set on fire

Insurgents attacked pipelines and an oil storage depot in three parts of Iraq, setting fires that blazed for hours and lost millions of gallons of oil, officials and media reported Sunday, as the country faced a critical fuel shortage.

Rebels firing rocket-propelled grenades hit storage tanks in southern Baghdad on Saturday, creating fires that burned about 2.6 million gallons of gasoline, said Issam Jihad, a spokesman for the Oil Ministry. Also Saturday, a pipeline

exploded in the al-Mashahda area 15 miles north of Baghdad, in what Jihad called "an act of sabotage." The explosion led to the

destruction of (part of) the pipeline and to the leakage of vast quantities of oil products," Jihad said.

He said he had no immediate information about another reported attack on oil pipelines in northern

#### Mirpur double murder Stranded Pakistanis threaten siege to home ministry

Stranded Pakistanis in Mirpur vesterday threatened to lay siege to the home ministry if police failed to arrest in three days the killers of a salt trader and his son, shot dead in Saturday's morning rampage.

The threat came from a rally, staged by the Stranded Pakistanis General Repatriation Committee (SPGRC) amid frayed tempers in protest at the killings of Fakhruddin Ahmed and his school-age son Miraj in Pallabi

The gory episode that played out during breakfast of the family ended in three minutes and the killers walked away -- unchallenged by a crowd of locals.

# 20,000 bulldozed out of city slum

The Housing and Building Research Institute (HBRI) yesterday bull-dozed about 20,000 people out of their shanties in Kalyanpur in an eviction drive that prompted protest from rights groups and political

Two bulldozers rolled into the slum about 2:00pm with back-ups from about 300 policemen led by a magistrate and smashed the shanties on 53 acres where the slum dwellers were living for 20 years.

"I have to pass nights out in the open with my family," said Ramiz Uddin, who migrated to Dhaka before the Liberation War after he lost his house to river erosion in

Ramiz alleged that the authorities did not issue any prior notice and announced the eviction drive only yesterday that caught the slum dwellers off-guard.

"The government should rehabilitate us as we have no other place to live in. They forced us into the streets," said Nargis, one of the angry women, who filled the nearby

But Rafiqul Islam, director of the HBRI under the housing and public works ministry, said the HBRI owned the land, adding: "We have served notices on the slum dwellers and announced our eviction decision before."

Rafiqul, who was present at the site, told The Daily Star that a set of people built illegal houses on government land, rented them out to slum dwellers and pocketed money.

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## State deptt lauds Dhaka for religious freedom, critical of minority rights

The US praised Bangladesh for generally allowing its citizens to freely practice their religion of choice, but criticised its police forces for often being "slow to assist members of religious minorities who have been victims of crime."

The State Department made this observation in its fifth annual inter-

national religious freedom report that was released recently by its Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights and Labor. Police, who generally are inef-

fective in upholding law and order, often are slow to assist members of religious minorities who have been victims of crimes," the report said in its chapter on Bangladesh.

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
