PM's 'Karnaphuli bridge' promise falls flat

The 72-year-old Kalurghat Bridge is virtually on the verge of collapse. And the other bridge named after Hazrat Shah Amanat has not been in a good condition for quite some time

These two bridges on the river Karnaphuli have linked Chittagong city with most of the areas in greater Chittagong, including Cox's Bazar and Bandarban districts.

People of vast areas such as Patiya, Anwara, Boalkhali, Chandanaish, Lohagara, Satkania and Banshkhali depend on both the bridges for communications

About 10 to 15 lakh people of southern Chittagong will be cut off from the rest of the country if the two all-important bridges can no longer handle the traffic. Although Kalurghat Bridge is still serving well, it had developed several big cracks over the years. The bridge was the only option for about 10 to 15 lakh people of southern Chittagong to travel by road until 1991 when

the Shah Amanat Bridge was built against the backdrop of 1991 cyclone. On the other hand, the Shah

Amanat Bridge has never been a smooth track for vehicles since its opening. Rather, it remains a 'death-trap' for the passengers as it is so fragile and ramshackle.

Each day, passengers run the

risk of fatal accidents while crossing the bridges. But the authorities have turned a blind eye to this danger.

In such a situation, construction of a third bridge on the

Karnaphuli is the crying need of the time. This necessity should be given top-most priority, as the existing two bridges are unable to bear huge load any longer.

In her election pledge, Prime

Minister Khaleda Zia said her government would start building the third bridge within three months of coming to power, but there is no sign of such move till

She made the pledge at a public meeting at Gomdandi Pilot High School in Boaldali Upazila on September 13, 2001, about 17 days before the last

The third bridge can reduce the sufferings of the people of southern Chittagong to a large extent. Their distress has mounted in May 2000 when the heavy vehicles were asked to stay off the Shah Amanat Bridge on

off the Shah Amanat Bridge on

safety ground.

However, administrative sources hinted that the issue of third bridge is likely to figure high on the agenda of a cabinet meet-ing to be held for the first time in Chittagong in mid-January.

All eyes of the people of Chittagong people are now set on the outcome of the first-ever cabinet meeting at Chittagong Circuit House.

Tamakumundi: A materialist's heaven

Tamakumundi was once famous for being the location where the grandfather of the great Muslim personality, Habibullah Bahar, who was a great friend of poet Kazi Nazrul Islam, and arranged for Nazrul to come to Chittagong for the first time in

in this maternal grandfather's house of Bahar for a couple of days, Mahbub Ul Alam, writer of Paltan Jihaner Smriti came from Fatehabad, Hathazari, to pay a visit to Nazrul. That was the first meeting between these two First World War veteran writers, and the relationship would continue and grow more, finally leading to

Nazruls's visit to Mahbub and Dider's house at Fatehabad in January 1929. (Dider Ul Alam, Mahbub's younger brother, an emerging poet of the time, but who died very early, had established a friendship with Nazrul, and was instrumental in bringing Nazrul to visit Chittagong.)

Mahbub wrote in his book Paltane that Nazrul stayed for two nights (January 26 and 27) at Fatehabad and was much charmed by the thicket of the betel nut trees of the village.

Whether that house of Habibullah Bahar's grandfather is still there or not I don't know, but I know for sure that Tamakumundi, an integral part of the Reazuddin Bazar, has completely changed itself

into the prime business district of the port-city, so as to make the thought of the Rebel Poet's staying here very difficult to imagine.

Tamakumundi is now a materialist's heaven and also haven, because everything from an office pin to the latest wide and flat screen TV is available here, fully compact, unopened, brand, and foreign. No complaint! Once I bought recorder from one of the electronic shops here, which proved to be original and functional compared to the other sets bought by friends from New Market or other shopping centers. The days for using a video-cassette privately is over, but my machine is still good, though we don't use it because the video tapes

have been replaced by CD's in the video-market.

Such is the quality of things that you can buy at Tamakumundi, which is apparently a long tunnel-like alley, intersected by a maze of by-lanes and sub-lanes, connected with a cumbersomely structured building that has narrow corridors and narrower staircases leading to an upper floor which stores all kinds of ctronic goods, both possib and impossible to buy, garments and clothes, crockery and cookeries, toys and games. calculators, telephone indexes. hair-dryers, bangles, bracelets, necklaces, rings, stone ornaments, cosmetics, nail polish, soaps, buttons and needles, all kinds of ladies' wearing and everything, and everything in brand quality and highly fashionable order.

But there is a big 'but'. The butt of this but is that nowadays the fake culture of stocking contraband items, illegal goods, and products of inferior quality has overtaken the market, as fake local items are being sold as the original. As we reported in an earlier writeup about the ship furniture that the market has been corrupted by the grafting of local timber replacing the original wood, so has the market of Tamakumundi been a subject to the gradual invasion of the local items being promoted as foreign goods. Interestingly enough the customers' eyes do not often see through this faking business.

Noman was addressing the first meeting of Health Care Advisory Committee of Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) here on Saturday.


