Tripartite talks between govt, investors and US in 11/2 months to resolve TU issue in EPZs; WB to coordinate

The US yesterday virtually agreed to give Bangladesh an extension of about two months to decide on allowing trade union in export processing zones (EPZs), as the issue will be resolved through a tripartite understanding taking

The latest US nod came from a

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## Intelligence unit to check VAT dodge

Collection up by record 70pc in Jul-Nov

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday directed the National Board of Revenue (NBR) to form a separate intelligence unit for detectingVAT (value added tax) evasions.

He also asked the board to maintain separate accounts of VAT payments made by government, private and multinational bodies.

In the first five months (July-November) of the current fiscal year, VAT collection has grown by a record 70 percent, the NBR officials informed Saifur at a meeting held at

the finance ministry, sources said. Most of it has come from Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board, gas companies of Petrobangla and other governmental agencies. Private companies, in comparison, have paid lesser amount of VAT. This difference prompted the finance minister to emphasise keeping separate

accounts for different sectors. The NBR proposed to the finance

minister to slap an embargo on import of core industrial raw materials, as such imports create wide

scopes for VAT evasion. Saifur, in particular, blamed the service sector for not paying amount of VAT. For instance, only 300 out of the hundreds of restaurants in the city pay VAT. And the total VAT they in the last five months SEE PAGE 11 COL 6

#### Capital feels the chill

Dhaka residents yesterday got the hang of how winter in full fury may feel as rains and wind chilled them to the bone with skies remaining cloudy for the best part of the day and temperature dipping further thanks to a low in the Bay.

The capital recorded a 2.3 mm rainfall, but that was enough to make people shiver with cold and stay indoors. Other parts of the country also had rains.

Things are not going to get any better today, however, says a weather forecast. Worse still, the mercury is likely to slide further tomorrow although clouds are likely to clear by then.

"The cold will intensify when the mist clears. Temperatures might fall by 2-3 degrees Celsius across the country," said Samarendra Karmakar, deputy director of the Met office.

The depression is now passing through the northern Bay sweeping northern Bangladesh, eastern India, Nepal and Pakistan.

The lowest temperature recorded yesterday was in Chuadanga at 11 degrees Celsius and the highest in Teknaf at 29 degrees. The minimum temperature in Dhaka was 14.8 degrees Celsius and the highest 25.7

The bodies of 15 Bangladesh Army officers, killed in Thursday's air crash in the West African country of Benin, will be flown back home by Wednesday.

A nine-member army team from Sierra Leone, Benin's strife-torn neighbouring country, has identified the dead and wrapping up other formalities that stemmed from the largest casualties in a single accident in Bangladesh army since independence.

The army headquarters in Dhaka hopes the task would be complete by today. The officers -- ranking from

captain to lieutenant colonel -were deployed to Sierra Leone and another strife-riven country, Liberia, on United Nations peacekeeping missions.

The 15 peacekeepers were among the 119 people killed in the crash that came after the plane botched its takeoff, clipping a building before tumbling nose down into the nearby Atlantic Ocean.

According to international law, the postmortem will be carried out in Benin. Lieutenant Colonel Nazrul Islam, director of Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), said yesterday, adding: "If postmortem facilities are available

world, including Iran's arch-foe the United States, to help deal with what appeared to be the world's most lethal earthquake in at least 10 years.


"It is my impression, with the scale of the disaster, that the toll is more than 20,000," said Interior Minister Abdolvahed Mousavi-Lari,

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

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


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
