Graft, poor FDI dealing plague energy sector

BEA dialogue asks energy adviser not to misinform people about energy situation

Corruption and improper handling of foreign direct investment (FDI) are two prime plagues afflicting the energy sector, said the keynote paper of a dialogue in the city vesterday.

Energy experts and economists at the dialogue blasted the govern-ment for what they said was misleading people about the power and energy situation in the country, and for escalation of corruption and lack of transparency in the sector.

The Ministry of Power, Energy and Mineral Resources has not seen a full minister in the last eight

years, reflecting the government's lack of commitment to resolving the problems of the sector, they

Bangladesh Economic Association (BEA) organised the dialogue on 'Current Situation of Power and Energy in Bangladesh' at the Jatiya Press Club, with BEA President Prof Qazi Kholiquzzaman Ahmad in the chair.

In his keynote paper, Prof M Nurul Islam of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) presented a comprehensive overview of the dismal energy situation.

He said the numerous loop holes in the deals with foreign oil companies show a critical lack of participation of legal experts in the

Prof Islam named improper handling of FDI, corruption and inadequate funding of the Bapex programmes as some of the main barriers to implementing the national energy policy.

He also urged the government to enact a law prohibiting gas

The temple located in Misripara in Kalapara of Patuakhali is too small to accommodate a centuryold 20-foot idol of Lord Buddha The true colours of the concreteand-stone-made Idol have long ago faded out due to lack of preser

Lack of renovation has created several large holes on the roof of the tin shed temple through which water drips inside during the rains and the sun burns the idol during

The altar on which the Idol was put up wears an awful look as it has already lost all its decorations. The inscriptions, believed to be written in Burmese language 120 years ago describing its history, can hardly be

200 feared dead in Indonesia landslide

Rescuers call off search for safety concerns after retrieving 16 bodies

AFP, Java

A landslide unleashed by heavy rains in Indonesia's Central Java yesterday killed 16 people but hundreds were feared dead as rescuers called off a search for survivors amid safety concerns.

A torrent of mud slammed into dozens of homes in Sijeruk village, 370 kilometres east of Jakarta, in the second disaster to hit Java island this week caused by monsoon rains and, activists charged, deforestation.

"We suspect there are about 200 people in 120 houses buried in the mud," local chief of police operations Budi said, adding that about 150 police and soldiers were involved in rescue operations.

A district welfare official, Umar Yulianto, said the toll stood at 16.

He said about 570 people lived in the area, with one section where **SEE PAGE 19 COL 7**
