Dhaka to ratify UN **Convention by June**

Bangladesh is likely to ratify the UN Convention to protect the rights of migrant workers and their family members by June 2006, said a high official of the Ministry for Expatriate's Welfare and Overseas Employment yesterday.

At a meeting with the female migrant workers at the National Press Club in the city, Joint Secretary Amir Hossain said the ratification of the convention is a lengthy process as it involves meetings with different ministries.

"But the draft Overseas Employment Policy for safe migration is going to be finalised soon. A meeting will take place on January 18 with the foreign minister in the chair to finalise the policy. Then it will be send for the approval of the cabinet," he said.

Bangladesh Ovibashi Mahila Sramik Association (BOMSA) organised the meeting titled 'Voice of Female Migrant Workers' to highlight the problems that the

The female migrant workers spoke about their harassment and repression in the receiving countries and deception by the brokers. They also demanded immediate ratification of the UN Convention as well as finalisation of the Overseas Employment Policy for safe migration.

 $The\,UN\,Convention, initiated\,in$ 1990 to protect the rights of migrant workers and their families, was signed by Bangladesh government in 1998, but it is yet to be

As a result, safe migration of women who are the largest source of remittance in the country, was hampered, said the speakers.

"The government should ratify the UN Convention immediately to end irregularities in sending migrant workers especially the women. The ratification would also help them send more remitAction Aid Bangladesh TIM Zahid

Bangladesh is lagging behind in sending the labourers abroad though the migrant workers are playing vital role in the country's economy by sending remittances worth nearly 3.5 billion dollar every year, he said.

Help poor patients with your Zakat

CRP appeals to Muslims

Centre for Rehabilitation of the Paralysed (CRP) yesterday appealed to Muslims to give their Zakat money to its Zakat Fund for the treatment and rehabilitation of the poor patients admitted to the

CRP created its Zakat Fund to enrich its fund without depending on foreign donations, which is declining in recent time.

The fund will be used as per the rules of Zakat for the needy patients, said CM Shafi Sami, managing trustee of the Trust for Rehabilitation of the Paralysed (TRP) at a press conference at the CRP in Savar on the outskirts of the

"If a Muslim wishes that their Zakat should be used only for Muslim patients, it will be com-

The former foreign secretary Sami said most of the patients admitted to the centre come from very poor families.

The treatment of the patients of spinal cord injuries is very expensive, which is almost Tk 15,000 per month, Valerie A Taylor, member secretary of the TRP told the jour-

The worldwide phenomenon of aid is declining, which is why the foreign donor agencies are stress-ing the need for building local ownership of the centre, Sami noted, adding that many individuals and corporations are also coming forward to help the CRP.

Responding to a question he said, "Zakat Fund meant to be made by the Muslims is in no way a religious discrimination, but an additional measure to enrich the financial capacity of the CRP, so that the patients whose lives are in alarming condition have the access to treatment and none die for lack of medicine.

With the creation of this fund the CRP can provide better treatment to more patients at the CRP where there is a 100-bed hospital for the patients of spinal cord injuries and additional 21 beds for the cerebral palsy child patients, he

the cerebral palsy children for exercise and has a special school where the physically challenged children are given education. CRP also has a women rehabili-

The centre trains the mothers of

tation centre at Gonokbari of Savar where the paralysed women are trained for self-employment. Since its inception in 1990, CRP

Savar centre treated and rehabilitated 4765 patients while everyday at least 300 patients receive outdoor services. Many patients, who recover, but need special types of instru-

ments for their movements, also require a good amount of money, said TRP Member Leena Alam. "This is a matter of life and death, so we appeal to the generous people to come to save lives."

Maj Gen Dr Muhammad Nurul Haq (Rtd), acting chairman of TRP, also spoke at the press con-
