India need a genuine fast bowler: Greg

Having transformed the Indian team into a winning unit, coach Greg Chappell rues the absence of a genuine fast bowler in the line-up who he believes will help his team bridge the gap with world champions Australia

Chappell said a tearaway fast bowler would be a more potent weapon in the bowling arsenal as he could win matches in all sorts of

"To me Australia still is the number one team in the world, they are the benchmark. I am pretty happy with the progress we have made in recent months, be it in ODIs or in Test matches. But we would need a genuine fast bowler,' the 57-year old former Aussie captain said.

'History tells us that teams with tearaway fast bowlers are the ones which win in all sort of conditions.

"At the moment we are keeping our eyes on a couple of bowlers But so far our bowlers have done what could be asked of them," he told PTI in an interview.

"In Zimbabwe, our fast bowlers did what was required of them and in India our spinners made good use of the conditions.

"Men like Ajit Agarkar might not get many wickets but they get important breakthroughs." Chappell said that on flat tracks like the one at Gaddafi Stadium for the first Test, the bowlers, of either the fast or the slow variety, need to show patience, a virtue best exemplified by Anil Kumble.

Mashrafee returning

Named in A side to play UAE

Injured paceman Mashrafee-Bin-Mortuza is set to return to action after a four-month lay-off.

His return to competitive cricket was confirmed on Saturday when the national selectors, after getting the green signal from Bangladesh team physio Paul Close, drafted the Narail quick in the 15-member Bangladesh A team against the visiting United Arab Emirates team.

The UAE reached Dhaka yesterday to play four limited-overs matches. But Mashrafee, who broke down at the start of Bangladesh's away series against Sri Lanka in September last year, will feature in one of the two limited-overs matches at the Khulna Divisional Stadium on January 26 and 27.

Mashrafee, who had his both knees operated on, returned from Sri Lanka after his back gave in a day before the first Test. Since then the 22-year-old embarked on yet another painful rehabilitation programme and only started to bowl in the nets at the Mirpur indoor facilities three weeks ago.

While the selectors wanted the Khulna match to assess his recovery from the long injury, Mashrafee was keen to get into action even before that.

There is every chance for me to play the Super Six match of the Premier Cricket League on Monday," Mashrafee told The Daily Star Sport yesterday, Mashrafee is a registered player of Mohammedan.

Chief selector Faruque Ahmed also wanted the country's leading pace bowler to play in the Premier

"We actually included him in the A team to get the exact picture of his injury and he will play only one match against UAE. We have also no problem for him to play in the ongo-ing Premier League," said Faruque. But Mashrafee's participation in

the Premier League for Moha-mmedan would depend on a ruling of the CCDM. Mohammedan have already fulfilled their quota of three national pool players without Mashrafee. But the non-availability of Aftab Ahmed throughout the league due to jaundice might give him the opportunity to play as the third 'pool' player.


Faruque was however more interested about the Khulna match.

Shabbir ban to stay

An independent bowling review group (BRG) has upheld Pakistan pace bowler Shabbir Ahmed's 12month ban from international cricket after a hearing in Dubai.

"We have decided the player had an illegal bowling action and the suspension of the player is to be maintained. This is the unanimous view of the BRG," said the BRG in an International Cricket Council (ICC) statement on Saturday.

"While it is clear a laboratory test can never fully replicate match conditions, the regulations provide for match conditions to be simulated as best as possible.

"We take the view the laboratory test was carried out as fairly and properly as it should be." The 29-year-old Shabbir was the

first player to receive a 12-month suspension under the revised ICC bowling review regulations after his action was reported twice in The BRG, which included former India pace bowler Javagal

from the Multan Test against England in November after which Shabbir was reported again. Shabbir, a six-foot five-inch seamer, played 10 Tests and 32 oneday internationals, with best fig-

ures of five for 48. The amended regulations, introduced in March 2005, stipulate that a player who is found to have been bowling with an illegal action twice within two years will face an automatic 12-month ban

The decision of the BRG is final
