Israel rules out possibility of talks

Hamas was under mounting pressure to renounce violence Friday after its shock election win as Palestinian leader Mahmud Abbas prepared to task the radical group with forming a new government.

The sensational victory for the Islamist movement in Wednesday's election has thrown prospects for Middle East peacemaking into turmoil and triggered alarm in Israel and across the

Moderate Palestinian Authority

president Abbas was to ask Hamas to form a new government, with the chief candidate for the Islamist movement saying he expected a meeting in the next few days.

Israel ruled out talks and the vanquished Fatah Party rejected a joint government with Hamas after the Islamic movement's sweeping victory in Palestinian elections, in what could be first steps to isolate the militant group and freeze Middle East peace initiatives.

The US and European nations declared Thursday that Hamas could not form a legitimate government unless it drops its demand to destroy Israel and renounces vio-

"If your platform is the destruction of Israel, it means you're not a partner in peace, and we're interested in peace," President Bush said. Similar statements came from other parts of the world.

European parliament members spoke of the possibility that donors would cut off vital aid, putting Hamas under extreme pressure to moderate its hardline positions. The US consul in Jerusalem, Jacob Walles, said Friday it was too early

to discuss the possibility.

Israel was unprepared for the Hamas landslide. Foreign and defence ministry scenarios put such a stunning blow to the longruling Fatah as a low probability, officials said.

But after the rout, Israel's acting prime minister, Ehud Olmert, quickly ruled out talks: "The state of Israel will not negotiate with a Palestinian administration if even part of it is an armed terrorist organisation calling for the destruction of the state of Israel,

A ruling BNP lawmaker assaulted a businessman yesterday and a party worker on Thursday for hanging up and distributing calendars containing the picture of a rival candidate for BNP nomination in the coming parliamentary elections.

BNP lawmaker from Saidpur (Nilphamary-4 constituency) Amzad Hossain Sarkar also handed over one of them to police on charges of stealing bicycle. The police, however, released him after a few hours.

Amzad stopped his jeep in front of the electric shop of Bidhan Chandra Roy, 42, on Shaheed Dr Zikrul Haque road at around 10:00am and started to beat him for hanging up a calendar with the picture of Amzad's rival Prof Mahfuzur Rahman, Bidhan told newsmen.

Earlier on Thursday, Amzad's men forcibly took BNP worker Kazi Azizul Islam, 34, to the party office at around 9:00pm and beat him up for distributing the same calendar, the victim told reporters. Later, he SEE PAGE 15 COL 6

The families who have returned are also feeling frustrated as no water can be pumped out from tubewells, all their trees died and they cannot grow vegetables at their homesteads due to nonavailability of water, locals told a group of journalists who visited the "What shall we do when we

return to our houses...How can we be sure that spewing of gas that still continues will stop shortly, and it will not increase," said one of the displaced people, now living at a relative's house.

Two blowouts -- one in January and the other in June last year-during Niko's drilling dried up trees and crops and baked soil in about a square kilometre area on the north of the gas field in Tengratila, also known as Chhatak marginal gas field.

Environmentalists demonstrated immediately after the blowouts and a committee of the

environment ministry later demanded Tk 84 crore in compensation from the Canadian comdeclined to make the payment saying the estimate does not have

Immediately after the blowouts, groundwater started coming out of ocal tubewells automatically but no water can be pumped out now.

Faizur Rahman, who is still staying at his father-in-law's house away from the gas field, said the displaced people are worried if they can grow any crop on their

A displaced Rehana Begum, 35, staying with her relatives who have come back to their houses following Niko's request, said most of the tubewells installed by Niko cannot drawwater. In the wake of scarcity of drink-

ing water, Niko installed more than 30 tubewells in the affected area but only a few are operative.

Potential for more **IMB** violence considered serious

UNB, Dhaka

A US State Department communiqué has said the security situation in Bangladesh is volatile, mentioning that a terrorist bombing campaign and threats to US and Western interests have led to increased security measures around US government facilities in and around capital Dhaka.

It said banned Islamist terrorist group Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) has identified the governments of the United States and the United Kingdom as alleged enemies of Islam. It is unclear at this point what impact the recent arrests of senior JMB figures will have on JMB's ability to mount new attacks.

"However, the potential for

continued JMB violence, in Dhaka and elsewhere, should be considered real and serious," Bangladesh Consular Information sheet released by US Department of State

TravelWarnings said. The communiqué said the US embassy continues to see anti-American rhetoric and sporadic anti-American protests following Friday prayers at the national mosque, largely due to US involve-

Western powers want the UN Security Council to call on Iran to suspend its nuclear fuel work, according to a draft resolution being refined while the United States and its allies pursue diplomatic efforts.

Efforts to complete the draft continued Thursday as US President George W. Bush joined China in supporting a Russian plan to halt the Iran nuclear crisis. Russia has offered to manufac-

ture nuclear fuel for Iran and collect the waste so that it cannot be used for nuclear weapons develop-

Although Iran has said it is interested in the idea, the United States continues to lobby hard to get the International Atomic clear to Iran that outstanding Energy Agency to refer Iran to the

UN Security Council.

The United States, Britain, Germany and France were haggling with Russia and China over the wording of the draft resolution for an emergency IAEA meeting in ienna on February 2.
