

Govt denies fuel crisis

stations stopped selling fuel yesterday.

The administration even had to deploy police at some filling stations to avoid any untoward situation.

Our correspondents in Rangpur, Rajshahi and Gaibandha reported immense sufferings of people due to the acute artificial fuel crisis as the six fuel-carrying vessels could not deliver fuel to the depots in the northern districts due to sharp decrease in water level.

Our Rangpur correspondent reports: Most filling stations in Rangpur, Kurigram and Lalmonirhat remained closed as stock of oils ran short, Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) dealers claimed.

Police have been deployed at the oil depots of three companies in Rangpur for the last three days.

Although the district administration denied any crisis anywhere in the districts, they made arrangement of rationing petrol and diesel from a few filling stations with a view to easing the situation.

Meanwhile, what the oil dealers showed as the reason for the crisis contradicted the reason shown by the district administration and the three oil companies.

Masum Mia, owner of Shapla Oil Pump in Rangpur town, said the supply from the Baghabari oil depot remained suspended as its stock exhausted.

Eight filling stations and one floating depot reportedly went dry due to the scanty supply of fuel. The Iri-Boro cultivators from remote areas rushed to the district headquarters for diesel but returned disappointed as the filling stations remained closed.

BDNEWS adds: Awami League General Secretary Abdul Jalil yesterday expressed grave concern over the artificial crisis of fuel.

In a statement protesting the artificial crisis, he said the situation was created by the unrestrained speech of the finance minister.

A syndicate of unscrupulous businessmen loyal to the government is now capitalising on the situation, he alleged, adding that the commoners have become the victims of the situation.

He urged the government to stop the price hike of fuel, ensure adequate supply and sale to the real consumers.

The Bangladesh Awami Jubo League, Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) and Workers' Party also expressed concerns over the artificial crisis of fuel.

The CPB in a press release demanded resignation of the finance minister.

The Jubo League declared to hold protest rallies across the country on January 31.

again. The BIWTA officials termed the situation normal, saying they cannot take the pipe up to the bank to dump the extracted sand due to strong current.

However, the dumped sediment is returning to the downstream river again to damage the river's navigability. The officials said the accumulated sand has already accumulated at Mohonganj and the situation is same for Penchakola where the BIWTA is now conducting dredging work.

Officials of Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) could not say when oil will reach the Baghabari port where no petrol and octane arrived in the last 12 days. They also could not say when the oil in the stranded ships will be distributed to the northern region.

About 100 tankers from different fuel hungry northern districts are waiting at Baghabari port for oil.

Banking on the crisis, some dealers are selling oil at the depot gate at Tk 8,000 to Tk 9,000 higher than the original rate per tanker.

The same scenario was seen at Sirajganj intersection, 30 kilometre off Baghabari. Two hundred litres of diesel was being sold at Tk 200 higher than the government-fixed rate. The rate is Tk 400 to Tk 500 higher than the normal rate in Bera, Breeshaikha and Kolghat.

The BPC chairman will visit Baghabari depot today to observe the situation, according to BPC officials.

Meanwhile, resentment arose yesterday among oil distributors as Bogra district BNP General Secretary Saiful Islam hurled abusive words towards them during a meeting on oil crisis at the district commissioner's office.

The oil distributors said they might go for movement against the use of abusive words.

Narsingdi, and Comilla before resuming their final legs of the march towards Dhaka on February 5.

They will gather at Paltan Maidan, which will be the epicentre of the programmes on that day, claimed the coalition leaders.

The 'long march' was announced on the November 22 grand rally demanding an end to the BNP-Jamaat rule where the coalition also announced a 23-point national programme which vowed to separate the judiciary from the executive branch of the government, bring the perpetrators of all bomb and grenade blasts to book, hold direct elections to women's reserved seats in the parliament and award autonomy to state-owned radio and television channels.

Family disinherits Bangla Bhai aide

The top local aide to Bangla Bhai at Baghmara, Mahtab Khamaru, was disinherited from his family yesterday.

Mahtab's father Mohammad Ali Khamaru, chairman of Hamirkutsa Union Council, in a press conference said he has no relations with him.

"He (Mahtab) is a disobedient son and he is identified as a terrorist by law enforcement agencies, I have no relations with him," he told journalists. "He is responsible for his deeds," he added.

"Leftist outlaws have killed two of my sons brutally and they have also threatened me, yet I hate the Islamist militants (who) launched an anti-outlaw campaign in Baghmara in 2004. I want Mahtab to be arrested and I also ask all to inform police wherever he is seen," he said in a written statement.

He said he called for the press conference as law enforcement agencies are harassing him enquiring about Mahtab.

Police recently picked up Ali to enquire about his son.

Official sources said 54 close-circuit TV and 20 video cameras have been installed at the congregation. A total of 25 medical centres and camps have been set up to ensure healthcare of the devotees coming from home and abroad.
