TB is a communicable disease which spreads through cough and sneeze of an infected person. A sixmonth treatment can cure a patient. But TB becomes incurable if a patient does not take medicine or stop taking medicine before the end of the tenure of taking medicine, said the paper.

The speakers stressed the need for more media coverage on TB disease as due to lack of public awareness many TB infected patients still don't go to hospitals and upazila health complexes for free treatment.

Dr Mahbub Kamal said as TB is a poverty-related disease, collaboration between the government and non-government organisations is needed to fight the disease.

The BNP-Jamaat ruling alliance has proved itself an autocratic government by killing farmers and violating democratic norms in appointing the chief election commissioner and the two new election commissioners unflaterally, the leaders said at a rally at Muktangan.

This government has been resorting to repression frequently as it does not respect the democratic rights of the common people, they said.

Awami League Presidium Member Abdur Razzak presided over the rally while General Secretary Abdul Jalil spoke as the chief guest.
