Bush waives Pak export restrictions

US President George W. Bush on Wednesday waived restrictions on exports to Pakistan, saying it would ease the democratic transition in the South Asian nation and help combat terrorism.

In a memo to Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, Bush said he was easing prohibitions under the Appropriations Act, which targets countries where a democratically elected government has been overturned by a coup, according to a White House statement.

Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf grabbed power in a bloodless coup in October 1999, named himself president in June 2001 and was elected to a five-year term in a controversial election in April 2002.

Bush said the waiver would "facilitate the transition to democratic rule in Pakistan" and is "important to United States efforts to respond to, deter or prevent acts of international terrorism," according to the statement

RURAL MAINTENANCE PROGRAMME

42,000 women unpaid for 6 long months

About 42,000 women working under the Rural Maintenance Programme (RMP) in 4,150 unions across the country are living in destitution, as the Local Government Division has not released the funds for their salaries of the last six months.

The RMP was undertaken in 1983 with the goal to contribute to long-term sustainable socioeconomic development of rural Bangladesh.

Although the programme, jointly funded by the Government of Bangladesh, Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) and the European Commission (EC), had been designed in line with the 'food-forwork' concept, within a few years it was redesigned to provide employment to approximately 42,000 rural

disadvantaged women, and to maintain 65,000 kilometres of rural earthen roads. The government provides 55 percent of the fund for the programme, which is scheduled to end in June 2006

It was expected that after the completion of the programme these women would be adequately skilled to lead their lives towards a sustainable and secured future. Under the programme, there are

road maintenance associations (RMA) with 10 members in each These associations are basically self-managed teams. Each RMA member is recruited for a four-year cycle to experience two major components of the RMP, road maintenance component (RMC) and income diversification

CARE Bangladesh also plays a role in maintaining quality of the roads and provides technical support and training to the RMA women

so that they can learn different income generating activities. It is mandatory for every road maintenance crew to save Tk 14 out of her daily wage of Tk 55

However, due to the suspension of salary payments for six months these women workers have been thrown back to their previous situations. They have been incurring huge burdens of loans following the

During a recent visit to Mymensingh, The Daily Star talked to some of the RMA women in the

Halima, 33, a road maintenance worker of Satroshia village under Muktagachha upazila, whose eightyear old daughter Shilpi died of diarrhoea within 42 hours without having proper treatment, expressed grave sorrow and said, "I begged for money from everybody, the neighbours, the union chair

33 killed in religious violence in Pakistan

5 more die in Afghanistan

A suspected suicide bombing and gunfire killed at least 29 minority Shia Muslims in northwestern Pakistan yesterday and gunmen killed at least four more people in an attack on a bus, officials said.

The bombing targeted a procession in the town of Hangu in North West Frontier Province (NWFP) to mark Ashura, the holiest day for Shias. Officials reported several

Abdul Rashid, medical superintendent at the Hangu hospital, said 29 people had been confirmed "We have 29 confirmed dead

bodies," he told Reuters. "Some of them have bullet wounds. All of them are Shias.

A leader of the Shia procession, Maulana Khurshid Anwar, said a bomb exploded near a stage where he was about to address Shia

Enraged Shias set shops and a bank on fire and fired shots into the

air in the town 200 km west of Islamabad. Superintendent Mohammad

Ayub, of the Hangu police, said four people died in a shootout during a curfew imposed after the bombing one policeman, a soldier, and two

In another incident, unidentified gunmen opened fire on a bus outside the town, killing four passengers, including a woman, and injuring two, said a paramilitary commander, Aziz Rehman.

NWFP police chief Riffat Pasha said the bombing was a suicide attack and troops were sent to help restore order. Security forces put up barricades on roads leading to

"We have sent armoured personnel carriers there, and the Frontier Constabulary is also there," Pasha told Reuters. "The situation is pretty much under

control.

Interior Minister Aftab Ahmed Khan Sherpao said there had been three blasts and it could have been a suicide attack or caused by time

Pakistan has suffered Islamist sectarian violence for years, most of it directed by majority Sunni Muslims against Shias.

Hangu Mayor Ghani-ur-Rehman said he did not believe this traditional rivalry was responsible. 'I think it is not a Shia-Sunni affair -it is terrorism," he said, adding that there were also Sunnis in the procession, including himself. "I don't believe Sunnis of Hangu

would attack the Shias." Thousands have died in vio-

lence between Sunnis and Shias since the 1980s

EC ignores law on demarcation of constituencies

Last delimitation took place11 years ago

The Election Commission (EC) has been in violation of delimitation laws for not taking any steps to demarcate the parliamentary constituencies since the last population census held before the eighth parliamentary election in 2001.

According to Delimitation of Constituencies Ordinance, 1976. delimitation of territorial constituencies is to be done on completion of each census to have a balance between the electoral districts in regard to the number of voters. It has to be done for the purpose of the general election following the latest survey of population.

"The Election Commission has

delimitation of the constituencies, Election Commissioner AK Mohammad Ali told The Daily Star

He said the EC should immediately take a decision in this regard after reviewing the relevant laws. "We can still discuss the issue if the chief election commissioner convenes a meeting," he observed.

The EC delimited the constituencies and published a list of those on May 30, 1995. But the commission now seems unlikely to initiate the delimitation process before the ninth general election scheduled for early 2007, said sources. According to the existing voter

"We are not afraid of attacks by the United States or by other countries on Iran's nuclear installations because we have nothing to hide, we have no installations to produce nuclear weapons," Iranian Vice President Esfandyar Rahim Mashaee said here after meeting with his Indonesian counterpart.

US Defence Secretary Donald

Rumsfeld said this week Washington would not rule out using military force against Iran to prevent it from obtaining nuclear weapons.


