Biman cuts int'l flights, to lease 2 aircraft to maintain schedule

Tender to be floated by tomorrow

Amidst schedule chaos, the Biman Bangladesh Airlines yesterday decided to cut in international flights as an immediate solution and lease two aircraft to improve upon its dwindling fleet.

The Biman management at a meeting with State Minister for Civil Aviation Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir decided to float tender by tomorrow for dry lease of two aircraft in a bid to recover from the schedule disarray caused by grounding of its three DC-10s and

The Biman also made an March 28. npromptu decision to reduce flight frequencies on three international routes, cutting one flight from Dhaka each from the weekly two flights to New York, six to

London and seven to Jeddah. While the reduction on Dhaka-

London and Dhaka-Jeddah routes comes into effect immediately, that on the Dhaka-New York route will be made effective from March 13 as passengers have already booked tickets up to then.

The Biman will also review its whole flight schedule and go for further cuts in frequencies on other international routes between February 21 and March 27. The national airlines is expecting to gear up its poor fleet situation prior to the commencement of next summer schedule from

grounded in Brussels en route New York last Wednesday is expected to return home by today after necessary repairing, official sources said. However, the two other DC-10s and one airbus still remained in hangar.

Talking to the BBC Bangla service last night, Mirza Fakhrul Islam acknowledged failures in Biman's fleet planning and inability to procure sufficient aircraft due to financial insolvency.

He claimed that there was no interference from his ministry into Biman management but refrained from commenting on what had happened before he took the office

Gujarat poultry farmer dies

of avian flu PALLAB BHATTACHARYA, New Delhi

A poultry farmer died of suspected avian flu in western state of Gujarat while health workers yesterday carried out mass culling and vaccination of chickens in neighbouring Maharashtra state, a day after India was hit by bird flu.

The 27-year-old poultry farmer from Nandurbar district of Maharashtra, who was admitted to a Surat hospital in Guiarat, died on Friday, District Collector of Surat Vatsala Vasudev said. They are awaiting the blood-test report of the dead to confirm if he died of the flu, he added

Animal Husbandry Commissioner S Bandhyopadhya, however, said in New Delhi that no case of avian flu in human beings had been reported so far, adding that the situation was being closely monitored.

On this vast char land in the north, nothing changes

In the fading twilight, Sakhina wraps the pink wrapper around her tight and walks fast, cutting across a wheat field. She has to reach Baraigram village before darkness descends. Her hopes are pinned there. She needs to urgently raise Tk 15,000 to see her 14-year-old daughter married off to a farmhand and the Baraigram villagers promised to see to it. In her 21 years of married life, Sakhina could not save a single dime and today, when the time has come for her daughter's wedding, she feels helpless.

"I am a labourer," she says. "When I came to my husband's home 21 years ago, he had nothing, not even a cow. And I still have nothing.

Not entirely true; she has got the marks of age and hardships on her face, deep lines run across her sunburnt skin. And she has now two children, a paralysed husband who needs medicines every day, two ducks and two chickens. They all depend on Sakhina, who SEE PAGE 15 COL 4
