Pvt land phone operators asked to start service in 6 months

The telecom regulator also asked the land phone operators to submit the details of their subscribers including photographs in prescribed forms by February 28 as the first step of compliance with the controversial tele-tapping

No clear provision kept for punishing violators

The cabinet yesterday passed the draft of much-talked about Public Procurement Act, 2006 without keeping any clear-cut provision for punishment in case of violating the

In the draft, a drastic change has been brought about regarding the review panel. An option has been kept to make public purchase in the interest of the people while a scope for government intervention is also there in the name of resolv-

However, some negative features have been removed. The lottery provision has been omitted, negotiation has largely been cancelled, and the option of pur-

Tata finds discussions | Economic growth did brought convergence on four major issues

Dismissing stalemate over its investment negotiation with the government, Indian giant Tata says the talks so far brought a general convergence of views on four out of six major issues.

Of the two remaining issues, security of gas supply and its price, is the most critical one for Tata as its \$2.5 billion proposed investment in Bangladesh largely depends on it. Tata believes the issue can be resolved if the government is a little flexible in considering any of its two options on gas.

The first option is a fixed price of gas and the second one is its flexible price linked to the price swing of steel to be produced using gas

The ups and downs of steel price will determine gas price, having a lower and upper ceiling.

"Since our negotiations started back in May 2005, we have already reached a general understanding on five key areas of our investment," says Tata Group's Resident Director S Manzer Hussain. These are fiscal incentive, land for the proposed plants, infrastructure development, coal mining, power and power purchase issues.

"Any other unresolved matters are easy to resolve," he says. Details of the four resolved issues have not been chalked out but that should not be difficult, he added.

Experts tell CPD seminar, call for structural reforms

Bangladesh has been maintaining macroeconomic stability over a long period but could not achieve the expected growth and the result of whatever growth it had posted did not reach the grassroots level, observed some leading econo-

They said because of this reason inequality in the society has become one of the major issues which the government should address immediately for poverty alleviation and sustainable economic development in the country.

"Bangladesh is the only country

in South Asia which had a macro economic stability over the last one

and a half decades but the stability did not bring expected growth. On the other hand some south Asian countries like Bhutan, which had volatility in its macro economy, achieved higher growth," said Debapriya Bhattacharya.

At the same time the result of the growth did not reach the poor due to lack of good governance and other structural problems, he added. Besides, major investments went into those sectors which do not create employment for the poor, he observed focusing on rising inequality in the society.

Governor of Bangladesh Bank Dr Salehuddin Ahmed, however, termed the view as simplistic SEE PAGE 15 COL 6


