#### 40pc less import saved \$800m

Mahmud claims no diesel crisis

Energy and Mineral Resources Advisor Mahmudur Rahman claimed that he has saved US \$800 million this fiscal year (FY) by importing 40 percent less petroleum than the previous FY and there is no diesel or kerosene crisis in the country.

#### 100 injured in hartal clashes in Sirajganj

At least 100 people were injured, including eight policemen, in two followed by AL and BNP in Kazipur upazila and in Sirajganj yesterday.

More than 90 people were injured in a clash between AL and BNP activists on EB Road near AL office and on Eliot Bridge in Sirajganj over a police onslaught on AL activists in Kazipur upazila during the dawn to dusk hartal

The two groups engaged in an hour-long fight, police sources said. Fifteen shops and two houses were damaged in the incident.

Police used truncheons and two tear gas shells to get the situation under control. Eight policemen were also injured in the incident as they tried to calm the two battling parties.

The injured were taken to Sirajganj Sadar Hospital and local clinics for treatment.

Earlier 10 AL activists were injured, four of them critically, when Kazipur Police charged truncheons on them at Shimul Dair Bazar around 7:00am yesterday. Police went into action as AL set up a roadblock on Sirajganj-Kazipur highway demanding release of partisans who were arrested on Tuesday. Police arrested 19 activ-

# Communalism in education powered bigots

#### BEA general secretary says

Professor Abul Barakat, general secretary of Bangladesh Economic Association (BEA) yesterday said 'communalism' in education has led to the strengthening of economic power of religious fundamentalism since the country's independence.

"During this period, the number of mainstream primary schools has doubled but the number of Dakhil Madrasas has increased eight times," he said at a seminar on 'Education for Development' on the occasion of World Federation of Teachers' Unions (WFTU/FISE) executive committee meeting a

the national press club in the city.

Over the same time, enrolment in primary schools has doubled but those in Dakhil Madrasas increased thirteen times while per head public expenditure on students of the government middle class educational institutions is Tk 3.000 as against Tk 5.000 in madrasas, he added.

The government as well as donors want to show Bangladesh as a showcase where "attaining social indicators is becoming possible without much economic development", Abul Barkat viewed.

"What does high enrolment ratio mean when enrollees fail in the

minimum competency test? And why two out of every three children from disadvantaged socioeconomic background remain nonliterate or semi-literate even after competition of five-year primary education?" he posed questions.

Barakat also expressed his concern at the fact that the allocation in primary education has decreased from 54 percent of total education allocation in 1993-94 to 40 percent in 2003-04.

# **Major Shia shrine** wrecked in Iraq

## Sunni mosques damaged in revenge attacks

A dawn bomb attack wrecked a major Shia Muslim shrine in the Iraqi city of Samarra yesterday sparking protests, some of them violent, and forcing an urgent government appeal to avoid sectarian reprisals.

Some Sunni mosques were damaged in revenge attacks, Shia militiamen posted themselves on streets and Iraq's senior Shia cleric called for peaceful protests.

The Iraqi president said the

attackers wanted to derail efforts to form a national unity government. Iraq's national security adviser accused al Qaeda-inspired Sunni militants of blasting the Shia shrine

to foment civil war. There was no immediate claim of responsibility.

Gunmen burst into Samarra's Golden Mosque, one of Iraq's four holiest Shia sites, and used explosives to bring down its 100-year-old gilded dome, among the biggest in the Muslim world, senior officials SEE PAGE 15 COL 1
