# **Raking through rubble**

"My little daughter was crushed under a huge slab, as the six-storey Phoenix building collapsed in the blink of an eye," said a wailing Tajul Islam Shahin, father of five year old Shaila.

A student of KG-1 of Dhaka Pre-Cadet and High School in Nakhalpara, Shaila went missing just after the huge building at Shahid Tajuddin Sarani of Tejgaon, collapsed Saturday morning.

Shaila's bereaving parents broke down and were hardly in any mood to say anything. "As Shaila went missing, we immedi-

ately began searching for her all around," said her uncle at their east Nakhalpara house


"One of us suddenly saw a glimpse of Shaila's red frock under a huge concrete slab in an adjoining alley," said Shahin. "We rescued her body from underneath the rubble in a pool of blood.

"I can only appeal to the government to take stern action against the owner of the building for such negligence. I am just an ordinary man, I can not do anything," Shahin said.

A day after the accident, the area surrounding the collapsed building was filled with hundreds of people though the law enforcers cordoned off the area for smooth rescue operation. The monotonous roars of heavy rescue equipment, attempts to find any survivors under the rubble and anxious looking near and dear ones waiting for any kind of news of the missing made the surroundings bleak

Elderly parents of Humayun Kabir, believed to be trapped under huge pile of rubble, stood helplessly leaning against an army lorry watching the rescue work with a hope that was gradually fading.

"My two sons, Humayun and Shamim, were working in two different

rooms on the first floor of the building when it caved in," said Shahjahan Jamaddar (60), who rushed to Dhaka with his wife from his village Shankarpasha under Nalchhiti Thana in Jhalakathi to Dhaka yesterday morning, after hearing the news.

"It turned pitch dark when the roof collapsed covering the whole area with thick dust", said Shamim's mother quoting him. "He could see nothing. He said that before being rescued he called for Humayun once but got no response."

Both Shamim (22) and Humayun (20) came to Dhaka three months ago and had been working as sanitary masons

where he was, Nikhil asked me to forget about him and save my life instead by getting out," Rincon said.

"I finally found an opening after trying to get out from several corners but was obstructed by concrete slabs," he said.

"After I got out of the debris, I lost my senses.

The rescuers comprising of the army, BDR, police and Rab personnel were busy with pneumatic and manual hammers, pickaxes, gas cutters, excavators, drilling machines, dumpers, bulldozers and cranes

One of Humayun's cousin, Hanif was seen removing debris himself from a place where Humayun was believed to be working. "Humayun is still trapped underneath the rubble," he said.

Rincon (20) and Nikhil, were both breaking a wall on the ground floor when the building collapsed.

Rincon, who was slightly injured, went back to the spot yesterday afternoon to see the horrific site and also help with the rescue operation. He said: "Lying under rubble, I called out for Nikhil several times asking whether he was alive."

Nikhil responded but could not move as one of his hands had been trapped in the concrete debris. "As I moved to

when someone comes to point out the location of any one still trapped under the rubble," said a Lt. Colonel preferring not to be named

"We have also been cutting holes to get through the rubble when we locate a human body," he said.

Any human body trapped is unlikely to be alive, said a member of the Fire Service and Civil Defence.

Sometimes it turns out quite risky even for rescuers to carry out such operations because of enormity of the debris.

Deputy Director Joha of Fire Service said: "Rescuers retrieved a 20-year old vouth alive from beneath the rubble around 10 in the morning."
