Explosion at Ctg garment factory again

15 injured in stampede

At least 15 workers were injured in a stampede amid scrambles for exit as an electric generator transformer exploded at a garment factory during power outage in the port city's Atur Depot area yesterday evening.

Their fears were fuelled by a hangover of shock following an apparel factory fire that killed at least 55 workers in the city four

Fire brigade sources said a generator transformer blasted "with a big bang" on the ground

Only 20 inspectors for 50,000 factories

Three major factory accidents occurred recently -- two in Dhaka and one in Chittagong-- leaving 142 workers killed and more than 500 injured, many of them disabled for life. "Our manpower is too limited to cover all factories and take proper steps but we are doing our best," said Dr Md Serajuddin, chief inspector of factories.

But the government's factory Dhaka divisional factory inspection office. And only 20 inspectors are now deployed to inspect around 50,000 registered factories in the country. Of them, four are working at the head office, six at Dhaka divisional office and three at Chittagong, Khulna and Rajshahi divisional offices.

Outage leads to severe Khaleda faces water crisis in capital No let-up in sight

Unprecedented power outages have caused a severe water crisis in the capital making Dhaka Water and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) fail to meet the rising demand for piped water in the city.

As residents in the city's old part, Mirpur, Dhanmondi, Jatrabari, Shahidnagar, Gabtoli, Azimpur, and even of the diplomatic enclaves of Gulshan-Baridhara are reeling under an acute water crisis, officials concerned said with such an erratic power supply, things are not going to improve anytime soon.

Dhaka Wasa sources said due to

massive power cuts and low voltage of electricity in the pre-summer season, Wasa is unable to lift water by its 421 deep tube wells and is forced to use diesel-run generators as an alternative.

Amid the ongoing water supply shortage in the city, LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan had a meeting with Wasa authorities yesterday but no assurance of uninterrupted power supply has come, meeting

An inter-ministerial meeting, however, is scheduled for later this week to resolve the problem of water supply due to power outage.

More bodies, more cries

Death toll rises to 20, hopes for survivors nil

Ambia's wait for her missing son came to an end at last, though not the way she was expecting.

All her hopes were dashed in a moment and the world appeared to her not worth living anymore as she heard that Humayun Kabir's body was dug out from the first floor 15 minutes ago.

How will I survive now, how could the jewel of my life leave me this way!" the ill-fated woman screamed out at the top of her voice, as excavators were pulling

down the rubbles of the collapsed Tejgaon building at 8:45am yester-

With the recovery of Humayun's body, the number of deaths in the five-storey Phoenix building collapse now stands at 20. The other body recovered yesterday was of Syed Rustom Ali, 50, a subcontractor who was supervising the grill works on the ground floor.

No one alive could be recovered yesterday. Forty of the earlier resing treatment at Dhaka Medical



Army personnel take away another body found under the rubble of the doomed building in Tejgaon yesterday, three days into the disaster. With this recovery, death toll from the building collapse rose to 20.
