Dr. Keiji Fukuda, the coordinator of the UN agency's global influenza programme, told reporters that training of what is initially expected to be a hundred-strong pool of experts may begin as early as the summer

"We need people from a wide variety of backgrounds," Fukuda said, including epidemiologists, laboratory specialists, plus experts in logistics, ethics and communications.

KTS burn victims 2 extortionists worry about future

Many still being treated at

The fire has extinguished at the KTS Garment Factory in Chittagong for quite some time now, but many injured garment workers are still groaning with pain at different medical hospitals and clinics.

Composite Textile Mill on February

Five such burn victims--four females and a male--have been languishing at the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH). As they undergo

Dr Samanta Lal Sen, plastic surgeon at the DMCH, said 40-60 percent part of these victims' bodies was burnt. Their conditions are serious "especially because all of them got inhalation burn, which is extremely difficult to cure completely", he said.

Factory labourer Abdus Salam, 45, used to send half his salary of Tk 3.000 a month for his wife, two daughters and a son in village. The family now faces an uncertain future as the lone bread-earner was severely burnt in the accident. SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

The announcement listed the name of only one of those hanged, Shukair Farid, a former policeman in the northern city of Mosul, who allegedly confessed that he had worked with Syrian foreign fighters to enlist fellow Iraqis to kill police and civilians.

"The competent authorities have today carried out the death sentences of 13 terrorists," the Cabinet announcement said.

Farid had "confessed that foreigners recruited him to spread the fear through killings and abduc-

tions." the government said. A judicial official said the death sentences were handed down in separate trials and were carried out in Baghdad.

"The 13 terrorists were tried in different courts and their trials began in 2005 and ended earlier this year," an official of the Supreme Judiciary Council said, speaking on condition of anonymity because he feared reprisal from insurgents.

In September, Iraq hanged three convicted murderers, the first executions of any convicts since Saddam's ouster in April 2003. The men, considered common criminals

rather than insurgents, were convicted of killing three police officers. kidnapping and rape. Capital punishment was sus-

pended during the formal US occupation, which ended in June 2004 and the Iragis reinstated the penalty two months later for those found guilty of murder, endangering national security and distributing drugs, saying it was necessary to help put down the persistent insurgency.

The authorities also wanted to have the option of executing Saddam if he is convicted of crimes committed by his regime. Under the former dictator, 114 offences were punishable by death.
