BB lifts provision Bankers still want more clarification

The Bangladesh Bank (BB) has withdrawn part of its controversial circular related to rescheduling of defaulted loans.

The BB in an amended circular yesterday withdrew the provision that allowed the banks to waive the principal amount of a defaulted loan if no further facility is

extended to the defaulter. Bankers settlement of compromise appreciated the move but also demanded that the central bank should withdraw other clauses of the circular to save nationalised commercial banks from being used for election financing.
