One-man show in 43 govt primary schools

Sad tale of education in remote haor areas of Kishoregani

Unbelievable though, 43 government schools in haor (water body) areas of Kishoreganj are run by one teacher each for long.

Seven of the schools are in Karimganj upazila, parliamentary constituency of Education Minister Dr M Osman Faruk.

Of the rest, 31 are in Bajitpur upazila, one in Itna upazila and two each in Nikli and Mithamoin

It was about 11 in the morning at Char Koranshi Government Primary School in Gujadia union in

This correspondent saw teacher Provat Chandra Biswas briskly moving from one class to another, giving lessons to students from class

Karimganj upazila.

In class five, Runa Akter (roll no. 4) said, "Sir (her teacher) asked us to do sums. He would come after teaching in classes three and four."

This correspondent found some students in that class who could not say what is the English alphabet next

Moving from one class to another and herding children is not Provat Chandra's only duty. As the 'head teacher', he has to perform other duties like maintaining records and doing other official work. He is also a voter enumerator in the area.

Provat Chandra said he is running the school alone since last year. "I have become weary", he said while talking to this correspondent.

Maiharul Islam is the lone teacher for 164 students at Char Nawagaon Government Primary School in Sutarpar union in Karimganj upazila. He is there for about two years.

There are 324 students at South Nansri Government Primary School in Joyka union in Karimganj upazila. "I have been running the school for over one year", said Shamsuddin,

At Tamny Bhuyanpara Government Primary School in Gojadia union in Karimganj, Helal Uddin said he is teaching 218 students from class one to five since

Same is the condition with many other schools in Karimganj. These include Bhati Gangatia Government Primary School with 183 students, Mokambari Government Primary School with 200 students and Shodhi Government Primary School with 253 students

In some schools, students said they often return home finding rooms closed without any prior

In some of the schools, the lone teacher has divided classes into two

shifts according to his convenience. Often, students of classes one, two and three huddle in one room and the lone teacher gives them lessons for one class after another.

In some others, the school is run in two shifts. Students of class one and two come for about an hour in the morning. Next come students of class three, four and five.

Karimgan thana Education Officer Touhidul Islam is aware of the condition of primary education in his area. But he has 'nothing to do as' teachers manage higher officials and leave the haor areas. Most of them cite bad road link and lack of accommodation a reasons for not staving in the area. he said.

District Primary Education Officer (DPEO) Sultan Miah said a

special policy is needed for these primary schools.

Many newly appointed teachers left their iobs within six months after they were transferred to the remote haor areas, he said.

"Raituti union in Itna upazila is about 30 kilometres from the upazila Sadar. To reach there, one must walk six to seven miles in dry season and hire a boat in the monsoon which costs at least Tk 100 for the 5-6 hours' journey", he said.

Government has provided motorbikes to Upazila Education Officers but these are of no use in haor areas, the DPEO said. He suggested that local jobless

educated youths should be appointed as teachers in their respective areas after training

Wife strangled for dowry in Khulna

A young man strangled his wife for dowry at Mejgunni in Khalishpur Friday night.

Sultana Parvin Shoma,20, was killed by her husband Golam Kibria,28, for failure to bring Tk 2 lakh and a television as dowry from her father. Earlier, Kibria compelled her to go to her father's house to bring the dowry last week. But Sultana returned empty handed. This infuriated Kibiria who strangled her inside their bedroom.

Police recovered the body and handed it over to her father Shaikh Nasiruddin of Boyra after autopsy at Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH) morgue Saturday noon.

Family sources said, Sultana Parvin was married to Golam Kibria on November 28 last year. Since marriage Sultana's husband and inlaws used to torture her for dowry.

A case was filed with Khalishpur Police Station naming Golam Kibria, his sister Noorjahan and her husband Ali Akbar as accused.

Police arrested Ali Akbar and Nooriahan but Kibria went into hiding.

Rivals abduct JCD leader, beat him up

Mymensingh cinema blast victims demand

Family members and relatives of cinema blast victims in Mymensingh town have demanded exemplary punishment to JMB kingpins Abdur Rahman and Siddiqul Islam alias Bangla Bhai and their followers.

Twenty-one young people were killed and over 100 injured in serial bomb blasts in packed Ajanta, Chhayabant, Aloka and Purobi cinema halls on the day of Eid-ul-Fitr on December 7, 2002...

Twenty of the injured have become maimed and disabled for life. Abdur Rahman confessed to interrogators in Dhaka that cadres of Jamaatul Mujahideen, Bangladesh (JMB) blasted the bombs. Salimullah Babu, owner of Aianta

cinema, told this correspondent that the memory of the fateful event still hauntshim. Babu lost his right leg in blast.

Physically handicapped, he now passes days in great hardship. "I was inside the Hall. It was hellish,

unbelievable. There were blood and scattered bodies all around. I also felt pain in the leg but could not understand what had happened. I lost sense a few minutes later. When I regained sense, I found myself on hospital bed", he said.

Babu said he is very happy that Shaikh Abdur Rahman and Bangla

Bhai have been arrested. "But victims like me will not get back normal life". Many others died or became crippled and their families have been destroyed

ment to the JMB kingpins and steps to root out such mindless violence from the country.

Nikhil Sarker, a shopkeeper, was one of those killed. His wife Mala Rani and daughter Nira Sarker said their family has been ruined following the killing of Nikhil, the only earning member of the family. Nira is a student of class six now. "I do not know how I will bear her education expenses", said Mala Rani. "They (JMB men) are killers. So they should be given capital punishment. They made us pauper"

"Every year, cinema blast tragedy day (on December 7) is observed and we attend the programme. That is all. We do not get any help to sur-

"JMB leader Abdur Rahman confessed to ordering the cinema blasts, so it is easy to try them under existing laws", added Mala Rani.

Sources said there has not been any headway in investigation into four blast cases. Immediately after the incidents, government arrested 31 leaders and activists of opposition Awami League (AL) including Saber Hossain Chowdhury and Mymensingh district AL president

Pinning hopes on Amropali

This year is supposed to be an offyear for mangoes. But Amropali. a new variety of hybrid mango, is showing signs of a bumper production, to the disbelieve of horticulturists in Khargachhari.

in hills five years ago has opened up great prospects for farmers in the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT), promising hefty gains The production in Khagrachhari

this year may be like that of last year, which was an on-year, Horticulture Department officials and farmers

The hills with suitable soil and climate may be turned into mango orchards as in Chapainawabganj, they said.

Amropali is now being cultivated in at lest 600 small gardens and 36 larger ones in Khagrachari district, said horticulturist Mizanur Rahman at Khagrachari Horticulture Centre. Most of the gardens are in Dighinala, Khagrachhari Sadar, Panchhari, Manikchhari,

Mohalchhari and Laxmichhari in the

"Budding started late this year as flowering started after the bitter winter cold. The weather, temperature and soil are suitable for Amra Pali cultivation in the (CHT) hills", he told this correspondent.

In a modest target, yield fr gardens in Khargachhari may be 75, 000 mounds if weather remains favourable for two months more. he said. The horticulture centre distributed 37,000 Amro Poli planta in Khagrachhari ,Rangamari and Bandherban districts in last two years, Mizanur Rahman said.

But the gardens are facing the biggest threat from brick fields. There are more than 100 brick fields in CHT and around 40 of them are in Khagrachari, he said. Smoke from the brick fields badly affects mango buds.

"Its price per kilogram remains at least Tk 10 more than other mangoes", farmer Sneha Ranian Chakma said in Kukichhara.



Feasting on Khagrachhari forests

30 truckloads of illegal wood leave the hill dist daily

Plunder of trees from Khagrachhari forests is going on unabated right under the nose of the administration and the forest department.

Every day, at least 30 truckloads of illegal wood find their way to different brick fields and unauthorised timber markets in Khagrachhari, Rangamati and Chittagong districts, sources said.

This correspondent detected that more then 40 areas in the eight upazilas from where the illegal timbers and wood are collected by traders, allegedly by 'managing' forest department staff.

The areas include Zoutha Khamer, Baillahachhari, Guimara and Tabalchhari in Matiranga upazilla; Lemuchhari, Zeromail and Zamtali in Khagrachhari Sadar; Chhoto Merung, Babuchhara and Maiddah Boyakhali in Dighinala; Logung, Pujgung and Latiban in Panchhari; Patazara and Baganbazar in Ramghar. Laxmichhri and Manikchhari upazilas are the main centres from where the fire-wood are being supplied to different areas and brick fields in Khagrachhari, Rangamati

and Chittagong.

Mong Ching Marma, a timber trader, admitted that he like many others are felling all kinds of trees

almost regularly.

Abdul Jalil, another trader in Merung area in Dighinala estimated that more then 30 truckloads of illegal timber leave the forest areas every day, virtually without any obstruction from the forest partment men.

He said these timbers and wood are sold to brick fields or traders in other districts. The plundered

timbers include Kona, Shal, Segun and Jarul, he said. One truckload of such timber is sold at between Tk 20,000 and Tk 30,000, he said. "When forest department staff come we manage them", he

The district administration and the forest department on several occasions said they would take steps to stop the plunder of trees

from forests, but to no effect. The district officials on January 20 told newsmen that action would be taken against illegal felling of trees. But only Tk 20,000 was realised as fine from two brick fields since then. Neither any timber trader was touched nor any of the illegal brick fields burning hundreds of tonnes of firewood a day was closed,
