Tigers eye delightful double

If the victory margin in the last two games is an indication. than Bangladesh will go into their third

one-day match against Kenya as the overwhelming favourite at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium today The Tigers, already 2-0 up in the

four-match series after resounding victories by 131 runs in the first game at Bogra and by nine wickets at Khulna, will however seek to achieve two things by winning the third game in the new international venue at the outskirts of the city. A win at Fatullah will not only give

Habibul Bashar's men a decisive 3-0 lead against their East African rivals but will also guarantee them a place in the ICC Champions Trophy to be held in India next October.

The match starts at 9:30am with state-run Bangladesh Television (BTV) and Channel i beaming live

coverage from the fourth purposebuilt international venue of the country after the Khulna Divisional Stadium, which made its ODI debut during the second match on March

Although the series lost its competitive appeal after two huge victories for the hosts, it suddenly received a twist after the game's ruling body ICC announced that if Bangladesh are to guarantee the tenth spot in the one-day table and thus qualify for the Champions Trophy they must win at least one of their remaining two games against

The latest revelation certainly puts additional pressure on Bangladesh, though coach Dav Whatmore played down the 'pressure factor'

'We knew it before the series. But our focus at the moment is to win tomorrow's match and clinch the series. We have been playing good cricket so far and we just want to maintain the same standard," said a relaxed Whatmore

Captain Bashar also echoed the

sentiment of his coach.

"Qualification in the ICC Champions Trophy is not an extra pressure for us. The way we played the last two games there is hardly any scope to think of anything other than a victory. Our fielding was not up to the mark in the last match and we are keen to improve on it in the last two games," said the Bangladesh captain.

Bashar also said that he was not really bothered with the slow wicket

"I think at the moment it is not a big factor whether we bat first or not. We are in great touch and I believe that we can win the match in any situation against Kenya. But I think it will be a very good batting track," said a confident Bashar.

Bangladesh announced a 13man team with left-arm spinner Manzarul Islam making it into list of probables in place of Raiin Saleh. Although the team management is set to retain the winning combination, Manzarul stands a chance to play the role of super-sub, which will still be effective in the series despite

the ICC decision to scrap it in future

There was also good news for Kenya with their skipper and best batsman Steve Tikolo, who missed the second game due to fever, declaring himself fit for the next two matches at a venue, where he won a lot of games for Dhaka Premier League champions Old DOHS.

"I'm feeling much better and looking forward to play in the important third game. We are not thinking about ICC Champions Trophy qualification. Rather our main target is to bounce back in the series by winning the game," said Tikolo. "I believe that we have the ability

to do much better than the previous two games. Still, it is not impossible to make it 2-2 if we win the third game." he added.

Coach Roger Harper said that his young brigade was yet to play to their potential in the series

Tendulkar out of ODIs

Indian batting superstar Sachin Tendulkar has been ruled out of the upcoming one-day series against England due to a shoulder injury, a top official said here on Tuesday.

"Tendulkar will undergo a shoulder operation in London shortly. Depending on the outcome of the surgery, he will be unavailable for a period of at least eight weeks." Indian cricket board joint-secretary M. P. Pandove said.

India will play seven one-dayers against England, the first starting in Delhi on March 28.

Tendulkar, however, is expected to bat in the second innings on the last day of the ongoing third and final Test against the tourists here on Wednesday.

He is the world's highest scorer in the shorter version of the game with 14,146 runs in 362 matches with a record 39 centuries.

Tendulkar is also likely to miss a one-day series in the West Indies, scheduled to begin in May.

Opening batsman Virender Sehwag and off-spinner Harbhajan Singh returned to the squad after missing one-dayers due to injuries in Pakistan last month.

A lucrative 6-yr package

Bangladesh put behind the looming threat of their very existence in the elite Test family when they won an encouraging package for the next six years at the ICC board meeting held in Dubai on Tuesday.

BCB general secretary Mahbubul Anam, who represented Bangladesh in the much-talked about two-day meeting in the ICC's new headquarters, was extremely delighted to announce that Bangladesh were not only given a go ahead to play home and away series like the other established cricketing nations in the new FTP (Future Tour Programme) for the next six years, but were also awarded the right to host significant international events after their eye-catching success at the junior level.

A delighted Mahbub informed that Bangladesh are hoping to host the 2012 ICC Champions Trophy, along with either the 2010 or 2014 ICC Under-19 World Cup as well as six 2011 World Cup matches

"Four sub-continent board officials will meet on April 21 to decide on the compiling bidding for 2011. We have expressed our desire to host the 2012 Champions Trophy and either the 2010 or 2014 Under-19 World Cup's. We are hopeful about getting the nod when ICC's special board meeting will decide on the next eight years events on April 30," Mahbub told

reporters at a local hotel yesterday. "There had been lot of talk about reducing the number of away series of Bangladesh and Zimbabwe over the last two years but I can now assure you that we will play against all the teams on a home and away basis like our previous arrangement. We made a very good impression in the meeting, especially our junior cricket has impressed the others a great deal," said the bearded BCB general secretary. He said that the new FTP also

gave them an opportunity to make huge financial gains in the coming

"We are expecting much higher TV deals this time around as we have now matured enough to bargain about the matter and have a very good home slot in the six-year

FTP programme to make it possible. We are expecting 22 home Tests in the next six years which will be a much higher number than the previous one," he explained. What made Mahbub most happy

was the arrangement of three triangular series in the programme. "The FTP has assigned us to

hold at least three triangular series involving India (twice) and they have also agreed to it which is a big boost for us. We can even arrange another additional triangular series in that period." he said. The existing TV deal with the

Eng land historic win

Andrew Flintoff and Shaun Udal made a mockery of India's famed batting line-up as a depleted England squared the series with a crushing 212-run victory in the third and final Test here on Wednesday.

It was England's first Test win in ndia since 1985.

India were shot out for a pathetic 100 off just 48.2 overs in their second innings while chasing a stiff 313-run target on the fifth and last day. They lost their last seven wickets for 25 in a dramatic afternoon collapse.

England had lost the second Test by nine wickets at Mohali after drawing the first at Nagpur, but raised their game when it mattered most. Their final-day heroes were Flintoff and Udal. Fast bowler Flintoff finished with

3-14 off 11 tight overs in his first Test

series as captain and was brilliantly

supported by off-spinner Udal (4-

14), playing only his fourth Test at the age of 37. The tourists were without key players Michael Vaughan, Marcus Trescothick, Simon Jones and Ashley Giles, and pace spearhead Steve Harmison was also absent for this Test. But they were superbly led by Flintoff who used his bowling resources ably in hot and humid

conditions. He was named both man of the

match and man of the series. England virtually had the match in their pocket when they removed key batsmen Rahul Dravid and Sachin Tendulkar in the opening two

overs after lunch.

The in-form Dravid stonewalled for 60 balls to score just nine runs before being caught behind off Flintoff while Tendulkar was smartly caught by Ian Bell at short leg off

Tendulkar, booed by his home crowd after his first-innings dismissal for one run, contributed only 34. He has been without a halfcentury since his world record 35th Test hundred against Sri Lanka at Delhi last December.

India, chasing a record total to win a Test at home, were then struggling to save the game under pres-

sure but the task always looked bevond Virender Sehwag, Yuvraj Singh and Mahendra Dhoni.

Sehwag walked in with a runner (Wasim Jaffer) because of back spasms, but was soon trapped legbefore for a duck. He batted at number seven instead of opening the innings because he was off the field on Tuesday.


Dhoni lived dangerously, playing one shot too many against a disciplined England attack. He was dropped on three by Monty Panesar at mid-on off Udal but fell to the

same combination in the same over. England then made short work of India's tail, with Udal sparking celebrations in England's camp with the wicket of last-man Munaf Patel.

There was no hint of the coming collapse in the morning session in which India had lost two wickets for 57 runs after resuming on 18-1.

Nightwatchman Anil Kumble went in the day's third over, trapped leg-before by a Hoggard delivery which appeared to be missing the leg-stump. He failed to add to his overnight score of eight.

Jaffer (10) scored his first run after 23 balls when he square-drove James Anderson for a four. But it turned out to be his only display of aggression before he fell soon SEE PAGE 13 COL 5
