Biman bogged down by engine troubles

Struggles to maintain int'l flight schedule

Mechanical disorders of its ageing fleet continue to plague Biman with the national airlines failing to provide timely flights to passengers in various international

The Biman authorities are now walking on a tight rope in maintaining flight schedules and passenger safety as the engines of DC-10s develop troubles too frequently and its Airbus fleet has no spare engines to meet emergency

Biman sources said one of the four Airbuses still remains stuck up in Dubai due to engine collapse over two weeks ago. Biman engineers went to Dubai on Thursday and removed the troubled engine on Friday as the authorities finally managed to lease an engine through Hewlett Packard in

"We do not have any spare engine for Airbuses. Now that we ready for use at the end of this

to bring back the stranded Airbus by early Monday," a top Biman official said when contacted yes-

Engine problems delayed two international flights of Biman on Friday. A DC-10 on Dubai-Chittagong-Dhaka route was stranded for two hours and an Airbus operating on Abu Dhabi-Chittagong-Dhaka route for one

Of the five DC-10s in Biman's 13-strong fleet, four are now operational with frequent engine troubles and one is undergoing a D-check at the hanger complex at Zia International Airport (ZIA).

But it is quite uncertain if the DC-10 would be operational even after completion of Dcheck soon as its engine along with a spare engine is to be over-

"Both the engines are being overhauled in Amsterdam now and we expect at least one to be have leased one, we are expecting month and the spare one by the

end of next month."

Three of the five DC-10s and one Airbus got grounded in quick succession last month, forcing the national airlines to reduce the frequency of its flights on Dhaka-Dubai-Brussels-New York route and also on Dhaka-London and Dhaka-Jeddah routes.

Amidst chaos over flight schedules and lack of government decision on procuring more aircraft, Biman late last month floated international tender for leasing at least two wide-bodied aircraft. The bids close on April 6. It might take at least 2-3 months more to get the aircraft, sources

Biman operates flights to as many as six domestic and 26 international destinations with a fleet of five 30-year-old DC-10s, four Airbuses and four F-28s.

A Biman proposal to procure six Boeings and four more Airbuses at a cost of \$1.2 billion is lying with the Cabinet Committee on Purchase for over a year now


Two tremors jolted the port city and its adjoining areas on Saturday night and early yesterday in a span But there were no reports of

casualties or damage

Official sources said the first earthquake was recorded at about 10:24pm on Saturday. The magnitude of the 16-second tremor was measured 3.9 on the Richter scale.

The second tremor, which was felt at 2:14am yesterday, lasted for 26 seconds. Its magnitude was measured 4.9 on the Richter

The epicentre of the first earthquake was about 141 km away from the seismic observatory at Ambagan in the city and the second one 242 km off the observa-

Nation celebrates 36th Independence Day

The nation yesterday celebrated the 36th Independence Day, recalling the supreme sacrifice of millions who laid down their lives to free the motherland from the clutches of Pakistani occupation

A 31-gun salute at dawn marked the beginning of the celebrations for the Independence and National

The national flag was hoisted at the government buildings, offices of corporate bodies, banks, leading business houses and houses of the general public to mark the day.

On this day in 1971, the

unarmed valiant Bangalees of the then East Pakistan burst into a flame to resist the Pakistani occupation forces, who unleashed the worst genocide in the world's history to suppress them.

The peace-loving Bangalees took up arms as the father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman declared independence on March 26. The victory was achieved on December 6 after a nine-month War of Liberation.

President Iajuddin Ahmed and Prime Minister Khaleda Zia laid wreaths at the National Memorial at Savar at sunrise to pay homage to the martyrs of the Liberation

A contingent of the armed forces presented a guard of honour during the ceremony.

Speaker Jamir Uddin Sircar, leaders of different political parties including Awami League (AL), freedom fighters, ministers, diplomats, chiefs of the three services and senior civil and military offi-

Khaleda Zia along with other BNP leaders also laid wreaths at the memorial on behalf of the party.

The prime minister also laid wreaths at the mazar of late president Ziaur Rahman. BNP leaders and workers were present.

Low tariff for 15 more countries

The sate-run telephone operator is going to expand its economy overseas call service to another 15 countries from April 1 to check its income downslide due to a wide use of illegal internet telephony.

Bangladesh Telegraph and Telephone Board (BTTB) subscribers with international subscriber dialling (ISD) and nation wide dialling (NWD) facilities will enjoy the reduced tariff of Tk 7.5 per minute, official sources said.

Farmers block Jessore roads for power

Farmers put up barricades on all four roads to Chowgachha upazila for the second consecutive day yesterday, demanding uninter-rupted supply of electricity.

Sources from Chowgachha said thousands offarmers and the general public blockaded the Chowgachha-Jessore road at 7:00am.

The agitation stopped all vehicular movement on the roads, prompting the transport workers to fight back against the demonstrators. They damaged four shops and went on the rampage at the Independence Day celebration platform on Chowgachha Pilot High School ground.

Upazila Nirbahi Officer Ashoke Debnath was assaulted as he went to ask the agitators to lift the roadblocks.
