Due to sedimentation over the years and lack of proper maintenance, wetlands at Jahangirnagar University (JU) have been drying up, jeopardising the biodiversity and panoramic beauty on the campus.

The university swamps now require immediate excavation as most of them have been silted up while others become dry in winter

The JU has a total of 27 wetlands excluding two ponds near Maulana Bhasani Hall and Al Beruni Hall

Though the university authorities stopped leasing out lakes near academic establishments for fish cultivation a year ago, no initiative has been taken yet to renovate those already destroyed by fish cultivation.

Unplanned cultivation of exotic fishes has caused sedimentation through erosion of bank.

On the other hand, the erosion had compelled university authorities to get some wetlands dry as those threatened nearby roads and establishments.

The pond in front of MBH remained almost barren for over a year since the hall authorities had dried it for renovation.

The pond has now become a grazing field for cattle while some university employees cultivate water hyacinth in it during monsoon for cattle food.

The pond in front of Old Arts Faculty has also been dried up for renovation, but no work has begun yet.

Meanwhile, linkage of different dormitories' sewers to nearby swamps is contaminating water while dumping of wastage from university transports have caused the lake in front of administrative building almost fish-free.

The contamination is affecting the life cycle of amphibians, aquatic birds and plants.

Natural growth of almost 40 species of fish has been threatened while some endangered species of local birds including Bronzed Wing Jaccana (Jolpipi), Moorhen (Kali Pakhi) and White Breasted Water Hen (Dahuk), who were once frequented, are now hardly seen.

A Dhaka court yesterday directed the authorities concerned to produce five Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) members before it on April 30 in connection with three cases

After taking the cases into cognisance for trial, Judge Mohammad Momin Ullah of the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court set the date for the next hearing.

The cases -- one under the Arms Act and the two others under the Explosive Substances Act -- were filed with Uttara Police Station on January 5.

The accused in the cases are Wahidul Islam, 20, Shafiqul Islam, 30, Hafez Ibrahim, 30, Abdullah Al Faruq, 21, and Hanif, 22.

The Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) on March 30 pressed charges against the five JMB members, showing 36 people as prosecution witnesses.

The investigation officer dropped the name of Shakil alias Mollah Omar from the charge sheet as he was killed in a fight with the law

enforcers in Comilla on March 12.
Raiding the house of Ruhul Amin
