Probes of most money laundering cases stalled

The central bank identified 79 bank transactions as suspected acts of money laundering but only four cases were filed under the Money Laundering Prevention Act 2002.

Investigations of most of the cases are pending as the government has yet to decide who will investigate the cases after dissolution of the Bureau of Anti-Corruption (Bac)

The central task force on money laundering prevention will meet on Wednesday to discuss the matter with a view to speed up the pro-

Sources said the Bangladesh Bank (BB) after identifying the suspicious transactions had assigned Bac and the criminal investigation department (CID) to investigate the cases.

But after dissolution of Bac on November 21, 2004 the investigations of 55 cases were stalled.

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) primarily had refused to carry out investigations of the cases with a plea of limitations in its jurisdiction.

Later the central bank informed the banking division of the finance ministry to settle the issue

The finance ministry through the law ministry clarified that ACC has no problem in carrying out those investigations under section 5(1) of the Money Laundering Prevention

ACC yesterday in its meeting did not discuss the matter despite the issue being in its agenda but expressed its desire to discuss it in the next meeting.

Sources said, 20 nationalised and privatised commercial banks central bank as suspected acts of money laundering.

BB conducted investigations of the 205 suspicious transaction reports and identified 79 as acts of suspected money laundering. The suspicious transactions were made in both local and foreign

BB assigned Bac to investigate 55 cases and CID to 18 cases and the remaining two cases were filed under criminal laws and foreign exchange regulation laws as those two were linked with Gridhari Modi, an Indian citizen.

Traders protest JCD attack, keep shops closed

Tension mounted in and around Chandrima Super Market in the city yesterday as a big traders' protest rally was held near it and the market was kept closed and heavily guarded fearing further attacks by students allegedly belonging to Dhaka College unit of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD).

The students clashed with traders at the market on Sunday night, leaving about 50 injured.

The traders and the students had a series of clashes for over four hours from about 9:30pm, and police fired tear gas shells to bring the situation under control.

The students also ransacked some makeshift shops on the walkways around the market and tried to set the market afire. Traffic came to a halt on the road from Nilkhet to Science Laboratory

EU mulls sanctions on Iran over nukes

US tries to dampen report on strike plan

AFP, AP, Luxembourg/ Washington

The European Union could consider slapping sanctions on Iran, including a visa ban, if current UN-centred diplomatic efforts fail, EU foreign policy chief Javier Solana said

Speaking at a meeting of EU foreign ministers in Luxembourg, he meanwhile dismissed a report that the United States might take military action in the standoff with Tehran over its nuclear plans.

"We have to be prepared just in case they fail," he said, referring to

Islamic republic to renounce sensitive atomic activities, currently cen-

tred on the UN Security Council. "We have to begin thinking about that possibility," he said, referring to the possibility of eventual sanctions. Asked specifically about a visa ban, he said that such a move "is a classical type of measure that is taken."

The EU official dismissed a report that US President George W. Bush is mulling military options to knock out Iran's nuclear program.

The New Yorker magazine has reported that the administration is planning a massive bombing campaign against Iran, including use of bunker-buster nuclear bombs to destroy a key suspected Iranian

nuclear weapons facility. "I have read the article ... I think it has nothing to do with reality," he said, although admitting: "I don't know what is going on in the Pentagon and the different levels of the Pentagon."

However, Solana said: "Any military action is absolutely out of the table for us.'

said. "We have taken a master plan to provide electricity to all by the

The Kansat incident is a law and order problem and nothing related to power, he said, adding, "It is mysterious why Kansat became volatile while problems of similar type exist all over the country.'

20yr higher edn plan discourages politics

PM suggests monitoring cell for quick implementation

Khaleda called upon all concerned, particularly the teachers, to keep their contribution to spreading quality education in order to compete in the present competitive

"Proper and standard education is very necessary in today's world of competition. Only you can play a

leading role in this regard," the PM told a function arranged for submitting report on the 'Strategic Plan for Higher Education in Bangladesh: 2006-2026'.

Members of the strategic plan-

ning committee and six expert groups, including chairman of the University Grants Commission, vice-chancellors and professors of public and private universities and distinguished personalities of various professions and organisations, were present at the function at ICC in the PMO complex.

The prime minister suggested constituting a monitoring cell for quick implementation of the strategic plan for higher education, saying that initiative would be taken to properly implement the recommendations of the strategic plan with cooperation of all

UGC Chairman Prof Dr M Asaduzzaman, convenor of the 17member strategic planning committee, flanked by Education Minister Dr Osman Farruk and State Minister for Education Ehsanul Huq Milon

presented the strategic report. The 78-page report, which touched on a number of areas and issues, suggested bringing all public and private universities under an 'Umbrella Act".
