Australia take series easily SPORTS REPORTER

Australia expectedly whitewashed Bangladesh 2-0 in the Test series when the world champions cantered to a massive one innings and 80-run victory in the second and final Test yesterday.

Shane Warne, who had a poor start to the two-match series, finished with five wickets as Bangladesh were bowled out for 309 in their second innings before lunch on the fifth and final day at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium.

The hosts, who pushed the visitors hard to raise hopes of an upset victory but lost a seesaw first Test in Dhaka by only three wickets, survived only 26.2 overs after resuming on 195-4 despite a few lusty blows by Mohammad Rafigue. who smashed six sixes and two fours in a cameo 65 off 53 balls. The left-handed all-rounder whacked three over-boundaries off Warne in one over, which produced 21 runs. He was also equally harsh

Oil hits new high above \$74 on supply fears

Oil jumped to a fresh record high above \$74 a barrel yesterday after a steep drop in US gasoline inventories fueled fears of tight summer supplies at a time of growing anxiety over Iran's exports. The United States on

Gasoline stocks in the US fell as demand averaged over 9.1 million barrels per day (bpd), 0.8 percent more than a year earlier, the US Energy Information Administration (EIA) said.

"It's all about gasoline and it has been since January," said US consultant PFC Energy in a report, adding that stocks are at the SEE PAGE 11 COL 4


Saifur blasts opposition for calling hartal UNB, Dhaka




