Govt set to raise oil prices again

Cabinet to discuss it today

The government is going to hike oil prices once again to cope with the soaring prices in the international

Energy Division along with Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation and oil companies has already started working on how and to what level oil prices can be raised, sources in the Energy Division said.

The cabinet will discuss the

Yesterday Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman and the day before yesterday Energy Adviser Mahmudur Rahman hinted at increasing oil prices shortly.

Apart from diesel and kerosene,

prices of petrol and octane may also be raised, the sources said. According to present market

price, the government is being forced to sell per litre diesel at a price Tk 20 less than its purchase cost. Both diesel and kerosene are now being sold at Tk 30 a litre. However the government is selling petrol and octane at their purchase

Sources said if price of diesel is raised the poor would be hurt most. So the government is considering raising diesel and kerosene prices by small margin. Side by side the government is also considering dropping tariff rate to reduce BPC's

However all these issues will be settled in today's cabinet meeting.

Finance Minister Saifur Rahman, emerging out of a meeting with the Planning Commission members, yesterday told journalists that raising oil prices right before the elections is a very delicate issue, so a decision to this effect will be taken after discussion with all cabinet colleagues.

According to unconfirmed reports, a special chartered plane secretly took Sadequee back to the USA on Thursday, three days into his capture in Dhaka. He faces a charge of planning terrorist attack in the USA.

His father Sarder Mohammed Sharif yesterday gave some medicines to US embassy officials who promised to hand those over to his

Sadequee's activities were suspicious; so he was sent back to the USA. State Minister for Home

Lutfozzaman Babar told reporters yesterday emerging out of a meeting with the new US ambassador to Bangladesh, Patricia A Butenis.

"No extradition treaty is needed for that," he said, adding, "We have deported many people. Every year we extradite five to seven people to "He was handed over on the

basis of sufficient information and evidence about his involvement in militancy," BBC Bangla Service quoted the state minister as saying.

Chittagong seaport is facing tre-mendous ship congestions with highest ever number of ships waiting at the outer anchorage for

getting berthing space.

Last night 21 big ocean going vessels were waiting at the outer anchorage of the country's premier port to get berthing permission when all the berthing space at the port were occupied as 13 ships were loading and unloading goods, sources said Of the 21 ships waiting at the outer anchorage, 15 are container

carriers and the rest are carrying general cargo including wheat, cars, scraps and oil.

Each ship has to count \$10,000

"The long congestion at the

premier port will give a negative signal to the outside world and increase the price of commodity as the feeder operators will think of imposing extra surcharge for ships coming to Chittagong," a shipping igent said yesterday.

The report published in The Observer said the traffickers used new techniques to send the drugs to 'ghost' companies in UK. They used one of the most respected businesses of Bangladesh to mask their deadly trade.
