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CONTEMPT RULE FOR SKIPPING SC DIRECTIVES

3 secys apologise, one seeks exoneration

Three of the four top bureaucrats facing contempt rule for noncompliance with the Supreme Court's (SC) 12-point directive on separation of the judiciary yesterday apologised to the apex court for their 'unintended mistakes'. .

All the four bureaucrats--Principal Secretary to the Prime Minister (PM) Dr Kamal Uddin Siddiqui, Law Secretary Alauddin Sarder, Finance Secretary Siddiqur Rahman and Establishment Secretary Dr Mahbubur Rahman-yesterday submitted their replies to

Of the four, the establishment secretary appealed for exonerating

him, saying that he had nothing to do with what has been done for separation of the judiciary as he had joined the post afterwards. The rest three offered unreserved apology to the court.

On receipt of the replies, the five-member full bench of the Appellate Division headed by Chief Justice Syed JR Mudassir Husain fixed May 15 as the date for hearing on the rule

The SC issued the rule on April 3, asking the four secretaries to explain in three weeks why a contempt charge should not be brought against them.

The court order followed an updated contempt petition filed by Chowdhury Munir Uddin Mahfuz,

Cabinet approves new pay scale for govt workers

The cabinet yesterday approved a new pay scale for the workers of state-owned industries, raising their basic salaries by maximum 85

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia presided over the cabinet meeting.

Among 16 different pay categories the highest basic salary has been raised from Tk 2,300 to Tk 4,250 per month and the lowest basic salary has been raised from Tk1,550 to Tk2,850 per month.

Besides other allowances and benefits have also been increased. 60 percent of the basic salaries of those living in Dhaka metropolitan area and 50 percent of those living in other areas have been settled as house rents. However if housing facilities are provided by the employer, then there will be no house rent allowance. At present workers are entitled to 35 percent of their basic pay as house rents.

Skid-mount plants too inadequate for huge power crisis

The government's much-delayed move to add around 140 megawatt (MW) power to the national grid using costly skid-mount power plants is too futile to address the power crisis this year or in the coming years as the demand for it has exceeded 5,200 MW.

Interestingly, the government is still claiming that the present demand for power is not more than 4,100 MW. "This is intended to give

an impression that the level of load shedding is not very high," said a well-placed source in Power Development Board (PDB).

The cabinet purchase committee yesterday approved the PDB's tenders for awarding contracts for three skid-mount power plants --Shajibazar 80 MW, Bogra 40 MW and Fenchuganj 50 MW plants. This move was initiated about nine months ago to resolve power crisis

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Commerce minister Altaf loses portfolio Adviser Bulu transferred

The government last night removed Commerce Minister Altaf Hossain Choudhury from his current post following his failure to control prices of essentials and for failure to deal with some key international trade issues properly.

Adviser to the Commerce Ministry Barkatullah Bulu has also been removed from the ministry and made adviser to the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs

without portfolio.

The government gave Water Resources Minister Major (Retd) Hafiz Uddin Ahmed additional responsibility to look after the commerce ministry.

On March 25, 2004 the government made Altaf, the erstwhile home minister, the commerce minister replacing Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury.

The change has been attributed to the staggering failure of Minister Altaf Hossain Choudhury and Adviser Bulu to rein in the price spiral Altaf has been made a minister of essentials and other commodities. SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

BUTENIS ON BANGLADESH POLITICS

US Ambassador in Dhaka Patricia A Butenis yesterday said her country has no remedy for the political discord in Bangladesh, rather the government and the opposition will have to work things out through dialogue.

"I don't have any recipe for success here. We encourage the government and the opposition to continue to work together to resolve their differences," she said, adding, "We are not promoting any particular reforms, we do not do

Addressing her first ever press conference as the US ambassador to Bangladesh at the American Club yesterday, Butenis declined to make any comment on the opposition's proposals for reforms in the caretaker government and electoral issue through discussion.

Says British envoy

British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Anwar Choudhury cautioned that if the next election does not turn out free, fair and acceptable, the country will lose a decade in development.

"The next election is very crucial for Bangladesh and if it goes wrong all the development objectives would be hindered," he told newsmen at a meet-the-press programme organised by the Dhaka Reporters' Unity (DRU) at

its auditorium yesterday. "We want to see a stable, democratic and prosperous Bangladesh in the interest of relation between the two friendly countries," he said. Out of nine major areas of British foreign policy, seven are related to

Bangladesh, he explained. The British envoy underscored the necessity of holding direct talks--instead of exchanging letters--between the two major political parties of the country for easing the political deadlock. He also



talked about reducing corruption, combating terrorism and strengthening relations between Bangladesh and the United Kingdom (UK).

Choudhury lauded the recent government action to combat terrorism. "Though it took much time, we must recognise what the government has done," he said, urging people not to take the easy path of violence instead of solving

the problems through discussion. SEE PAGE 15 COL 1







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
