10 killed, 90 hurt as experimental steam engine explodes

Physics teacher made the low-cost engine to run irrigation pumps

Ten people were killed and 90 others sustained injuries when a steam boiler exploded at Baropaika village under Gobindganj upazila in Gaibandha district yesterday

The dead are Titul, 30, Amirul, 30, Sharmin 12, Nurunnabi, 14, Atiq, 7, Rurul Amin, Russel, Rafiqul, and two unidentified persons, reports our staff correspondent at Bogra.

The boiler exploded during a demonstration of a steam engine devised by Moinul Islam, a lecturer of Physics in Mohimaganj College in the district, said our Gaibandha correspondent.

Moinul said the cheaply made engine that was to be used for running irrigation pumps and other machines related to agriculture would be cost effective also as it could be run with gas instead of fuel oil, witnesses said.

Several hundred curious villagers gathered to see the demonstration of the steam engine.

As the maker started the turbine at about 5:00pm, the gas chamber exploded, leaving four people dead on the spot and many others

RMG sector fears 50pc output fall

Prevailing diesel and power crises in the country are forcing ready made garment (RMG) manufacturers to keep their factories idle sometimes for five hours of a tenhour working day, said leaders of the manufacturers.

Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) in a press conference yesterday said production in RMG industry might fall by 50 percent and production cost might go up by about 25 percent due to the crises.

The garment industry today faces a catastrophic fall and if the government does not address the problems immediately Bangladesh might lose its market to competitors like India and China.

BGMEA leaders demanded that the government improves the power situation urgently or provides them with diesel under special arrangement so they can maintain usual production rate. If diesel price is raised they want to be provided with diesel at a subsidised

said the government is claiming that there is no crisis of power and diesel in the country, but the reality contradicts its claim.

Munshi in his written speech said normally production goes on for 10 hours a day in garment factories, but now about five hours are being lost daily due to load shed-

Many of the garment factory owners resorted to generators, but the recent crisis of diesel has wors-

Munshi also said they usually collect diesel in containers or drums. But with the backdrop of fuel crisis, the government put a bar on carrying diesel in contain-ers, which Munshi said has been like 'adding insult to injury'.

Besides, 90 percent of the gener-

ators used in garment factories is diesel run and only about five percent is run by gas. So, in the face of diesel and power crises, garment factory owners are being forced to ship their product by air to make up for lost time in a bid to maintain deadlines. In the pre-qualification bid, Contech submitted a proposal for establishing a 52km underground at a cost of Tk 52,000 crore under a joint venture of a number of foreign and local organisations.

According to Contech proposal, MTRC of Hong Kong will work as the constructor, Sena Kallyan Sangstha, Bangladesh as financier and project manager, the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology as the lead consultant, Hitachi of Japan as equipment supplier, and JBIC as provider of supplier's credit and syndicated bank loan.

But, the firm did not provide authorisation letters of the companies it named as partners and financier in the project, the ministrypointed out in the letter.

36 EMINENT CITIZENS ISSUE STATEMENT

'Instability' from 'failure' of political parties worries them

Thirty-six eminent citizens yesterday expressed grave concern at the instability' in the country emanating from 'failure' of the major political parties regarding reform talks on caretaker government and the Election Commission, rise of militancy, price hike of essentials and various other issues.

Suggesting some reforms and changes, the civil society members urged the major political alliances to act sensibly for the sake of democracy and asked the people to take active interest in political

In a joint statement, they said it is a matter of grave concern that the opposition returned to the streets to realise their demands for reforms while the government continued its 'repressive' acts as the efforts for reform talks came to a virtual halt.

If the political parties cannot come to an agreement on issues like reforms in caretaker government, the Election Commission and electoral rules and process, they should present their ideas as draft bills before parliament for open discussions, the eminent citizens stressed.

They also asked the government to arrange a public hearing by the parliamentary committees so that the civil society members can convey their views to parliament.

"If elections could not be held through making the required changes, the unstable situation in the country would continue," they observed.

The joint statement also says it is a present day imperative that political parties are reformed through mandatory registration. The conditions of registration should include democratic practices within the parties, making all sorts of monetary transactions through banks, publication of audited reports on incomes and expenditures of parties, and nomination of persons active in a party for at least three years.

The renowned citizens also expressed concern at the price hike essentials, devaluation of taka, crisis of power, adverse impact of the shortage of fertiliser and fuel for irrigation pumps on agriculture and failure of the administration in different fields and reckless and rutal behaviour of the police.
