Thai Airways International issued an ultimatum to the Bangladesh government for clearing the impediments delaying the takeover of management of Shah Amanat International Airport by the company by June or to face legal

action Thai Airways Acting President Somchainuk Engtrakul sent a letter to the Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) last week venting the company's frustration after the authorities postponed the most recent date for the airport takeover, said a senior official of the Ministry of Civil

Aviation and Tourism. After a series of failed promises, Caab told Thai Airways that the company could start managing the airport

under a 10-year contract from April 1, there was a conspiracy behind the already two months behind the original schedule. But it failed again. foreign company.

Thai Airways now feels that it has been too lenient in dealing with the issue and that it is time to pursue legal proceedings against Caab for breach of contract.

Somchainuk in his letter called on Caab to abide by the contract and said Thai Airways would like to start running the airport in the next few months

Minister for Communications Nazmul Huda yesterday demanded investigation into the scandal of Beximco group of companies' default on Tk 2,600 crore of loans.

The minister, in a statement, also demanded publication of the paper about the allegation of its taking loans violating rules and procedures of 20 different banks and financial organisa tions.

Demanding legal action and punishment by the Bangladesh Bank (BB) the minister said Beximco plundered people's money and the BB should protect their interest.

The banks and financial institutions also failed to realise Tk 425 crore loans from the company, he added.

On the other hand, Tk 59 crore loans of the 26 companies of the group have been waived which left the banking sector vulnerable. He said the country's banking sector has become hostage to this com-

He also alleged the owner of the group Salman F Rahman started distributing black money in his constituency to gain popularity for the next elections.

ELECTORAL REFORMS PM blasts AL for 'blocking' talks

Prime Minister Khaleda Zia yesterday blasted Awami League (AL) for blocking road to discussion on electoral reforms through raising the issue of Jamaat and trying to "disrupt" the next general election.

India sends more troops to hunt killers

India rushed hundreds of extra troops to hunt for Kashmiri militants in the remote mountains of Kashmir vesterday, after 35 Hindus were killed over two days in one of the worst massacres

in the region in years. The troop deployment began as a general strike -- called to protest against the killings -- shut down the predominantly Hindu Jammu region of Indian Kashmir, where some half a million soldiers and policemen are deployed
