## Take action against those disrupting bus service

#### **BRTC** employees demand

Employees of Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTC) yesterday called on the government to take effective measures for smooth running of BRTC buses across the country.

They also called for legal action against the transport owners who are disrupting the state-run bus services in different

Using the party banner, a section of transport owners, particularly private bus owners' associations, often enforce unreasonable strikes on different routes to oppose the BRTC bus service, causing immense suffering to passengers, said the leaders of BRTC employees' union at

a press conference in the city. In fact, the owners' syndicate wants to make more profit by raising bus fares, said union leader Minhazul Islam. So, they are trying to weaken the BRTC

bus service, he added. He also demanded resumption of double-decker bus service of the BRTC in northern districts.

The union leaders said the double-decker bus service in northern region has been suspended under the pressure from the so-called syndicate and this syndicate is now continuing a strike in the region to press for its demand for withdrawal of the

BRTC bus service.

This syndicate even forced the BRTC to stop its services in southern region, they added.

The leaders demanded import of new buses for expansion of BRTC service across the country and action against those who humiliated passengers of BRTC buses during their travel.

They also threatened to stage a demonstration in front of the High Court on May 17 if the government does not meet their demands within 24 hours.

### SC hearing on CEC's appeal adjourned until

The Supreme Court (SC) yesterday adjourned until Thursday the hearing on an appeal filed by Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Justice MA Aziz against the High Court (HC) judgement on voter list.

On January 4, the High Court in its judgement on two writ petitions filed by Awami League General Secretary MA Jalil and two of his party lawmakers had asked the Election Commission (EC) to update the electoral roll based on the existing one.

Dr Kamal Hossain, counsel for the writ petitioners, concluded his arguments while Khondker Mahbubuddin Ahmed, representing the CEC, made his reply to his opponent.

Meanwhile, the hearing of the contempt of court charge facing four top secretaries, including Kamal Uddin Siddiqui, principal secretary to the prime minister, could not take place as the court hours exhausted with the hearing on the CEC's

The five-member full bench headed by Chief Justice Syed JR Mudassir Husain deferred the hearing to May 21.
