Shanta's case against cops dismissed

A Dhaka court yesterday dismissed the case of Shahin Sultana Shanta, victim of police brutality during a protest programme of the 14-party opposition alliance on March 12.

Judge Kaniz Akhter Nasrina Khanam of the Fourth Special Tribunal for Women and Children Repression dismissed the case, saying allegations brought against two deputy commissioners of police, a constable and 14 other unnamed cops were not proved.

But primary investigation of a judicial inquiry commission found evidence of torture by police, who were also widely filmed by the media on that day.

"Such activities of police are a punishable crime under Bangladesh Penal Code. Metropolitan Magistrate Shafiq Anwar, who headed the onemember commission, said in his report, which was submitted before the tribunal

It could have been appropriate for the police to arrest her and send to the court, but that was not done said the report.

Myanmar won't explore within Bangladesh waters

Foreign secy tells of Yangon assurance

UNB, Dhaka

Myanmar authorities have assured Bangladesh that they would never encroach on Bangladesh's territorial waters, saying that they believe in good neighbourly relations as the two countries have agreed on a number of issues of cooperation.

The assurance was given to Foreign Secretary Hemayetuddin during his visit to Yangon where he held the first formal foreign secretary-level consultations with Myanmar Deputy Foreign Minister U Kvaw Thu on May 19.

"They (Myanmar) do not believe they have made any encroachment...They assured that they will never encroach on Bangladesh's territorial waters at any point of time." Hemavet told newsmen at the foreign ministry yesterday on his return from Yangon.

This is the second attack on the same mobile court team in one month during hygiene drives in the

Following raids on the Café Baghdad, Hotel Modhurima and Hotel Tourist on the Topkhana Road nearly a hundred rowdy employees started chanting slogans against the mobile court men and chased them. They damaged a police pickup

van and threw brickbats at the police and BDR men, injuring a couple of

The magistrate, law enforcers, and reporters and photographers took shelter inside Gafur Tower.

"They often come and charge huge fine. We can not run business due to their drive," said a restaurant manager in the area.

"The team realised several thousand taka from here about a week ago," said a restaurant staff requesting anonymity

Magistrate Tapan Kumar, however, said the court never fined any restaurant without any reason. "The condition of the kitchens of

those restaurants is very unhygienic and so. I fined Tk 1 lakh to one and Tk 30,000 to another," the magistrate said, adding, "Anybody could go and see how filthy the condition of their kitchen and food preservation system is.'

As the mobile team fined Hotel Madhurima for its dirty environment and other faults, the furious employees carrying bamboo sticks chased the mobile court officials and law enforcers, he said.
