French squad in bust-up session

France coach Raymond Domenech admitted on Thursday that he had had a bust-up with reserve goalkeeper Gregory Coupet but insisted that the matter had since been

Coupet was seen having a heated exchange with Domenech on Wednesday as the 23-strong French squad continued their World Cup preparations at this ski resort high up in the French Alps.

He then was seen leaving the team hotel in his private car only to return later in the day. Coupet has admitted he was

upset after Domenech named Fabien Barthez as his first-choice goalkeeper for the World Cup even though he had held down the position over the last few games.

"Yes there was a problem between us and we had a heated exchange, said Domenech as the French squad, including Coupet, took part in another

"He lost his head - that happens. A World Cup is not easy to handle. Everyone has to deal with the stress. He left and came back by himself. It all happened very quickly.

"But the problem has been resolved, We spoke about it between ourselves and as far as we are concerned the matter is now over. End of story.'

This follows an incident widely

reported by newspapers that suggested that there was disharmony in the French squad. It was reported that following the bust-up, the Lyon player drove off

with his family in his private car only

to return to the Montana hotel half

an hour later. Coupet was then seen engaged in a heated discussion with Domenech and France assistant coach, Bruno Martini.

It is believed Coupet's fitness

director at Lyon, Robert Duverne, played an instrumental role in persuading him to remain with the squad.

Duverne is part of Domenech's management team helping to ensure France reach the June 9-July 9 finals in the best of health.

The French squad will stay in

Tignes until Friday when they travel back to their Clairefontaine base outside Paris. Barthez was the first choice

goalkeeper for France in their glory ears when they won the 1998 World Cup and Euro 2000. But injuries and suspension had opened the door to Lvon keeper Coupet and he had played well

Dhaka prisoners to enjoy World Cup

Prisoners in Bangladesh will be able to watch World Cup football for the first time, authorities said Thursday.

"The country's prisoners can watch the World Cup football for the first time as all the prisons now have televisions after we introduced them in 2003," said inspector general of prisons Brigadier General Zakir Hossain.

Hossain said they would let state-run Bangladesh Television, which owns the rights.

There are 71.000 prisoners in the country's 66 prisons.

The month-long World Cup beginning on June 9 is expected to draw record television audiences in the sport-obsessed nation.

The weather in Germany could be as full of surprises as the soccer during the World Cup, with cold fronts. heatwaves, heavy rain, bright blue skies or severe thunderstorms among the myriad of possibilities

Weather forecasters are loath to predict more than seven days ahead even though computers have improved the reliability of mediumrange outlooks to 95 percent since the last World Cup held here in

Past June-July weather data is also a poor guide because the northern European country with both continental and maritime influences can have damp and chilly weather or hot and dry spells. Some vears have maddening bouts of both in quick succession.

"You can't predict what will happen in June because there will

always be surprises," said Gerhard Lux, a meteorologist at the Deutscher Wetterdienst (DWD), the national weather service.

"Everything is possible," he told Reuters. "It depends on many factors, especially on whether the prevailing winds are from the west, which are often wet and cool. "Or they could be from the north,

which are often cold, or southwesterly winds, which are moist and warm, or from the south, which are hot, or southeast, which are dry, Lux said.

Because heavy rain played a role in 1974, especially when the West Germany hosts beat Poland 1-0 in the "Wasserschlacht von Frankfurt" ("Water battle of Frankfurt"), the heavens will be on the minds of players, coaches, fans and bookmakers

The historical data show a wide range. The June average is 15.4 degrees Celsius but a June average low record of 11.2 was set in 1923 and an average high of 19.4 in 2003. An all-time June low of 2.4 degrees below zero was recorded in Obertsdorf in 1962 and a high of 38.2 degrees was set in 1947 in

A storm with tennis-ball-size hail hit Munich on July 12, 1984, injuring 300 people and causing a record 3 billion marks (\$1.4 billion) in damages to cars and buildings. There have also been tornados and severe thunderstorms in June in recent years.

June weather can be unsettled but farmers and weather-watchers pay attention to some key dates. The first is the so-called

"Schafskaelte" -- or "sheep's cold spell" -- and temperatures sometimes drop by about 10 degrees to five to 10 degrees when it hits around June 9 -- the opening day of the finals this year.

The next critical date is June 27. According to German folklore, if it rains on this day, it will rain for the next seven weeks. But if it is sunny. statistics show the next few weeks are also warm and dry about 70 percent of the time.
