Crisis over '2 VCs' deepens

UGC meeting not held STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The University Grants Commission (UGC)-called meeting to resolve the present stalemate at Darul Ihsan University could not be held vesterday, leading academic future of the students into further uncertainty.

We could not hold the meeting as only six out of the 26 members of the university trustee board and a vicechancellor post claimant came to attend the meeting, said UGC member Prof Monirul Hoque, who has been tasked with looking into the issue.

The present crisis of the university began more than a month ago when both Sved Ali Naki, the former pro-vice chancellor, and Prof MA Rashid, the present treasurer, claimed themselves as the vice chancellor of the university. Ali Naki and Rashid are backed by

two groups of the university trustee The situation led to the closer of the university for over two weeks and

suspension of its academic activities for around a month. The university is now open, but all the classes are not being held, a student yesterday said, adding that that the teachers favouring Prof Rashid are now taking classes, but those who support Ali

Naki do not come to take their scheduled

WB shifts strategy to develop infrastructure

Next year's 40pc lending goes to this sector

In a shift from its earlier stance, the World Bank is reengaging itself in infrastructure development and stressing the need for public sector involvement in projects, the Bank's President Paul Wolfowitz announced

He also felt subsidies are "unavoidable and desirable" for pro-poor development.

The World Bank is rethinking its infrastructure strategy. It is reengaging in infrastructure investment. Next year, \$9-10 billion or 40 per cent of the Bank's lending will be in infrastructure," Wolfowitz said at the inaugural session of the Annual Bank Conference on Development Economics (ABCDE) in Tokyo.

"Infrastructure must focus on smart growth which is environmentally and socially acceptable and propoor to achieve MDG. It must not only be based on economic growth," he said. "It has to be affordable to the poor. For this subsidies are unavoidable and desirable too."

The Bank will use its technical expertise to strengthen regulatory $structure \, for \, in frastructure \, projects.$ Highlighting the urgent need to

take up more infrastructure projects, Wolfowitz pointed out that the global supply of infrastructure is not able to meet the need

Of the current 6.3 billion people, 1.6 billion don't have access to energy, 2.4 billion cook meals with wood and dung, 2.6 billion have no access to water and sanitation. And in the next 25 years the need for access to water, sanitation, airport and telephone will

Populations are becoming more urban and by 2025, 60 per cent of the people will live in cities and in the next 20 years, population of the developed world will double

"This is why preserving the environment will be important and infrastructure development and environment can go hand in hand," observed

The Bank is particularly worried about the situation in Africa, which he said "poses a special challenge to international community" because of high population, urbanisation and mismatch in infrastructure supply. In such a situation, the continent is unable to meet the MDGs.

The International Energy Agency estimates a \$220 billion investment in the power sector over the next 20 years, yet the current investment rate is 50 per cent of the need. Large scale energy projects have been undertaken in Africa but they need to serve the

"We cannot forget that 80 per cent of population in Africa relies on biogas. They need special support,' Wolfowitz stressed. "Electricity is so important for business in Africa, More access to energy and transportation is needed for livelihood.'

He said climate will be affected in the next 20 years because of infrastructure investment and so investment in efficient technologies is

Turning to the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), he said infrastructure development is crucial to achieve these. If the people do not get water, the goal in primary health cannot be achieved.

"Africa spends 40 billion hours just to carry water home," he SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

Iraq explosion

Two British soldiers die in attack

At least 52 people were killed in a bloody explosion of violence across Iraq yesterday, including a spate of bombings against buses carrying people to work.

The attacks underlined the parlous security situation in Iraq as agreement on the key defence and interior ministries remained elusive despite the formation of a new government on May 20, five months after national elections. Despite repeated assertions that a

final decision on the security ministers was imminent, the positions remain unfilled because of bickering among the major political parties.

In the deadliest attack Monday, 14 people were killed and 17 wounded when a bomb tore through a bus carrying Iraqis work from Khalis, about 80km north of Baghdad, to Camp Ashraf, the home of an Iranian opposition move-

"The workers were ordinary Iraqi

citizens who had ordinary jobs since a long time ago in the city of Ashraf." said Shahriar Kia, a spokesman for the movement, which blamed Iran's regime for the attack in Diyala province.

The organisation said the bombing recalled an attack against a bus carrying members of the People's Mojahedeen of Iran to Ashraf in June 1999, which left

2 killed in 'crossfire' with Rab

Bangladesh turned into arms smuggling route

Experts critical of govt's indifference

Militant and insurgent outfits in South Asian region are now using Bangladesh as a transit route for smuggling weapons, turning the region into a large world market of arms trade but the government still remains indifferent, experts and former army personnel

said at a press conference yesterday.

The country's south and south-east regions, especially Chittagong, Khagrachhari, Bandarban, Sandwip, Haluaghat and emerging char islands are often used for transportation of illegal small arms, and it encourages the use of illegal small arms and violence
