Pray for snow, you'll get at least rain

Ukraine coach Oleg Blokhin had prayed for snow before the World Cup match against Saudi Arabia, but in the end had to do with rain.

A storm broke stifling temperatures of 32 degrees celsius just before Monday's game in Hamburg and although the initial heavy rainstorm did subside, showers continued throughout the 4-0 drubbing Ukraine handed the 'sons of the desert".

"I did ask for snow, it's true," said Blokhin when asked if the weather conditions had played into the east Europeans' hands at the expense of their Gulf Arab rivals.

Saudi Arabia is a desert kingdom where summer temperatures can top 50 degrees celsius, often combined with all-encompassing humidity, and while there is substantial rainfall in the southwestern mountainous region, it is a scarcity in much of the rest of the country.

But coach Marcos Paqueta was not prepared to offer the rain as an excuse for the shoddy display his

We knew it could rain and it did rain. The pitch was very wet and the ball travelled very fast," said

"There's not much rain in Saudi Arabia and the players are not used to playing on wet grass but that said, it's not an excuse.

Sami al-Jaber, who-would have seen plenty of rain in the English Midlands during his loan spell at Wolverhampton Wanderers in 2000, said, "We have no excuse.

"We have trained in such conditions and it is not acceptable to talk about the rain as a factor.'

Blokhin, meanwhile, hailed his players for bouncing back from their 4-0 hammering suffered at the hands of Spain to deliver their own footballing masterclass against the Saudis.

Ukraine are now firmly back in - the running to qualify for the last 16 from Group H, with their third pool game against Tunisia on Friday.

"I would like to thank my team who bounced back from the bad defeat to Spain," Blokhin said.

"The players today carried out the coaches' advice, which was not to give the Saudi players any space or any ball," the former Dynamo

Kiev and Soviet Union star said. Saudi Arabia found our dead ball situations difficult and also the short passing game in midfield.

The objective was to prevent the Saudis getting any ball in the midfield, and our team was able to counter-attack very quickly."

Blokhin, however, was typically reserved when talking about his team's chances of qualifying for the knockout phase.

He said that the win over Saudi Arabia, combined with the moraledraining loss to Spain, would take some time to recover from.



Police are meanwhile telling fans to watch out for theft with 420 bag snatches in Berlin in the past week, compared with 250 normally.

Awards

Social Democratic and Liberal politicians in Germany are proposing to make special civic awards to police and emergency services workers involved in making the World Cup go with a swing. "They will receive a medal for their commitment and friendliness," said Peter Danckert, chairman of the German parliament's sports affairs commission.

Brazil striker Adriano, whose wife Daniele gave birth to Adriano junior on Friday, marked Father's Day on Sunday by shelling out on a new computer for himself so he could see e-mailed pictures of the infant as his old computer had given up the ghost. An additional gift to himself as well as the team was the forward's opening goal in the 2-0 win against Australia.

No rainbow for Zico

The rainbow may be a universal symbol of hope. But Japan coach Zico is too focused on their next must-win match against five-time champions Brazil on Thursday to wish upon a colourful arc.

Zico's substitute players resumed training in Bonn in pouring rain on Monday after a goalless draw against Croatia left them winless in Group F. As the rain stopped, a rainbow

appeared over the training ground but Zico said: "I do love to see rainbows. But I didn't notice one today because I was so concentrated on training."

Pitch repairs

Parts of the turf at the Hamburg World Cup stadium requires patching up after hosting three matches but will not need to be totally replaced, the organisers said on Wednesday. "There are some points which

are being looked at, such as in the goalmouths," organising committee spokesman Gerd Graus said at he daily press briefing in Berlin.

Two more matches in the tournament are being played in Hamburg - Italy's final Group E match against the Czech Republic on Thursday and a quarterfinal match on June 30.

The pitches at all 12 of the World Cup stadiums were laid in May, weeks before the World Cup kicked ffon June 9.

A chance for the reserves

Netherlands coach Marco van Basten could rest six players who are walking a disciplinary tightrope for the final Group C table top decider with Argentina in Frankfurt onWednesday. Giovanni van Bronckhorst, John

Heitinga, Arjen Robben, Joris Mathijsen, Mark van Bommel and Khalid Boulahrouz all have one yellow card each and another caution could rule them out of the second round.

"We don't want to take any risks for the next round," said van Basten. Midfielder Phillip Cocu (ankle) and defender John Heitinga (thigh) are both carrying injuries from Friday's 2-1 win over Ivory Coast

and are doubtful starters.

Argentina's Javier Saviola, Gabriel Heinze, Luis Gonzales and Hernan Crespo are also on a yellow card and will sit out Tuesday's game. Both teams have already quali-

fied for the next round and

Wednesday's match will decide who tops the group. Either Portugal or Mexico are likely to be waiting in the second round but van Basten insists he will not let his team be distracted by the next stage until they have completed their tricky assignment with

The Dutch have only lost once to the South Americans -- in the 1978 World Cup final in Buenos Aires.

"We will play to win," said the 41-year-old, who took over from Dick Advocaat following their semi-final exit at Euro 2004.

"We will be proud to finish top of the group by beating Argentina. They are one of the big favourites for the title.

"But even if I knew I would be playing this or that team in Group D, I am not going to alter my tactics at all in the hours before a match. There would be no sense.

"We play to win. Van Basten also paid tribute to his team claiming there is a new

spirit in the squad. "Without the spirit, we could have been beaten by Ivory Coast, but we defended well.

"But we need to improve our possession of the ball when we are being put under pressure by our opponents."

Cambiasso full of humility

It is easier to score a goal involving 25 touches by the team than dribble past several defenders like Diego Maradona's great World Cup strike against England in 1986, Argentina's Esteban Cambiasso said.

"It may be hard to imagine but it's probably more likely to score a goal with 25 touches ... than to dribble past two or three players because they can bring you down after the firstorsecond dribble," he said.

"To imagine a goal nowadays with half the dribbles that Diego made seems impossible to me but with one or two touches (per player) it's something more feasible," the midfielder told reporters at Argentina's World Cup base.

Cambiasso was the scorer when, half an hour into the match, Argentina strung together a brilliant move of 24 passes for their second goal in the 6-0 rout of Serbia and

Montenegro in Group Con Friday. Argentina gradually worked their way into the Serb box where Hernan Crespo backheeled Javier Saviola's pass to Cambiasso who struck a rising left-footed shot into

the roof of the net. Cambiasso's goal, his second in 24 matches for Argentina, has been acclaimed as one of the best ever in World Cups and potentially the best of this tournament with less than half the 64 matches played.

Former Argentina captain Maradona's goal, his second in a 2-1 win over England in the 1986 quarterfinals in Mexico, was voted the best in World Cup history. SEE PAGE 18 COL 7
