Brazil's Ronaldo confounded his many doubters with a predatory double against Japan which leaves him a goal away from becoming the top World Cup goalscorer of all

A neat header and a fine curling shot on the turn dispelled any notion that the 29-year-old Real Madrid striker has had his day -and perhaps a few too many culinary indulgences -- as his contribution in the 4-1 win in Dortmund took him to 14 World Cup goals, level with German "bomber" Gerd

"I have been very patient. You have to keep working and not lose heart," said the superstar, who added that the support of his family "has carried me through the bad times," including another injury-

Aussies acclaim hero Kewell

Coach Guus Hiddink and teammates Friday paid tribute to Harry Kewell whose most important career goal lifted Australia into the last 16 of the World Cup for the first

The Liverpool forward scored with 12 minutes left to give his team a 2-2 draw with Croatia which was enough Thursday to send the Aussies through to the knockout round as Group F runners-up behind champions Brazil.

Hiddink's team will face threetime world champions Italy in Kaiserslautern for a place in the quarterfinals on Monday.

Kewell has been battling a groin injury suffered in last month's World Cup, yet he still put in a manof-the-match performance that inspired his teammates and was lauded by the coaching staff.

"Before the game I was thinking how to use Harry because he's not in his top game shape and I was thinking of bringing him on later,"

Zico's last game in charge ended n a 4-1 defeat, the Brazilian telling his players they needed to be more professional in a brutally frank partingshot.

Needing to beat the world cham-pions by two goals in Thursday's Group F clash, the Japanese took a hock lead through Keiji Tamada's harp finish in the 34th minute.
