Owen ruptured his anterior cruciate knee ligament in the first minute of England's 2-2 draw with Sweden on Tuesday and is out of the tournament.

Whether coach Sven-Goran Eriksson opts to start with 25-yearold Crouch up front alongside Rooney against Ecuador on Sunday or uses Steven Gerrard as a second striker remains to be seen, but the Liverpool front man said he can do

"Obviously with Michael going there is a void to be filled and I hope I can fill it. I think myself and Wayne can compliment each other and it can work," he said at England's training base in southern

"There is one less striker but I have always had confidence in my ability that if I get the chance I'll do well and hopefully there's more chances for me to keep proving

Crouch has scored six times in his last six appearances for his country; including the crucial first goal in the 2-0 Group B win against Trinidad and Tobago.

Some commentators think he performs better when he comes off the bench, but Crouch, who numbers six clubs already in his career, insisted he can be equally effective over 90 minutes.

"Obviously, I want to play," he said. "I can make an impact off the bench but I can make an impact for the full 90 minutes as well. I've scored six in six now and hopefully l can keep that going." Crouch has proved an asset
